We pause together in the expectant hush of frosty mornings, for the coming of the Christ child.

The special licence is in fact a faculty obtained through the Archbishop of Canterbury's Office. In addition, we have also had a baptism; Florence Elizabeth is the greatgranddaughter of Peter and Margery Smallwood. Peter is the oldest man in St Thomas's congregation!

Youth Working

Wednesday Drop In:

With only Denshaw further out from the centre of Saddleworth, Delph might seem a strange place to undertake any youth work. However, some of the older members of the congregation saw a need for something to be done to meet with the youngsters of the village. After much prayer and conversation it was decided to start a group on a Wednesday afternoon (when the Saddleworth School is closed). Local businesses were approached and a sum of money was warmly received which when added to the grant given by the Diocese ensured that a variety of activities could be organised.

Although the group is small in number, this group has supported youngsters on their afternoons off. There is no pressure for them to attend, no pressure to hear the gospel, but the opportunity for them be somewhere dry and warm with refreshments all provided through the love of God.

Sunday Evening 'Participate':

This group has not been running very long and is open to all of the youngsters across the team who are either confirmed or in secondary school. The group offers young people the opportunity to explore their faith in a safe, non-threatening environment. During this autumn term we are using clips from the Harry Potter films to help us in our study of how we live our lives in today's world.

We meet on the first and third Sundays of the month from 7:15pm - 8:45pm.



Charitable Giving

St Thomas is committed to giving away 10% of the regular income (tithing) and supports five charities who annually supply a volunteer to speak to the congregation about the work of the charity. One of the organisations supported is **Toybox**.

Toybox's mission is to end the injustice of children living or working on the streets. Record levels of inequality, violence and migration mean children are forced to live or work on the streets, escape abusive homes, or end up on the streets after being displaced or trafficked.



For some children working on the streets can be their only means to earn an income. Some street children have been chased from home by violence, natural disaster or the need to earn an income. some have been sold or trafficked and have ended up on the streets. Children whose home life is full of abuse often take refuge on the streets to escape. However, they are at risk of being enticed by gangs offering friendship or financial gain. Others find solace in drugs and alcohol. For all of these children their future is bleak and their life expectancy terrifyingly low. Toybox currently works in five countries around the world helping children who are marginalised and abused by those who should protect them. They work with local organisations who are best placed to find the most appropriate ways to help children escape from a life on the streets.

One exciting project, in Guatemala - partnering with Conacmi - provides vocational training to young people as well as micro enterprise loans to enable young people to start their own businesses. Child protection is at the heart of this project, which partners with local authorities to establish a functioning and effective child protection system and local child protection committees.



An A-Z of Discipleship - 'P' is for Parents



We're working our way through the alphabet looking at what it means to be an active follower of Jesus Christ.

Parents – we have all had them. How does the Bible say we should treat them?

The first mention of parents in the Bible comes early in Genesis when

"for this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife." (Genesis 2 v.24).

A new unit is formed with marriage but it certainly doesn't mean that parents are to be abandoned.

There is a very high view of parents. One of the ten commandments is clear:

"Honour your father and mother, that your lives may be long in the land the Lord your God gives you" (Exodus 20 v.12).

There are some stern warnings about not obeying or honouring later in the book of Leviticus and elsewhere; one of the Proverbs is clear that:

"parents are the pride of their children" just as

"children's children are a crown to the aged" (Proverbs 17 v.6)

so the generations are meant to enjoy and be glad of each other.

The value of family life is made plain when Jesus replies to his disciples who are beginning to wonder what they have let themselves in for by following him.

"We've left everything..." (Luke 18 v.29) they say. Jesus knows it's a big thing. So he promises that anyone who has left parents, home, or land for his sake will receive their reward.

There is no excuse for not giving honour to parents

in Jesus' eyes. The Pharisees, religious to the extreme, have become so obsessed with the minute details of their religion that they are glorifying themselves by attending to the finer points whilst missing the big point. Tithing tiny things and dedicating things to God was taking the place of giving to their families (Mark 7 v.11-12).

In a different way, you will know that things are really taking a dive in terms of morality and heading towards the end of the world when

"...children will rebel against their parents..." (Matthew 10 v.21)

and Paul says that children who disobey parents are amongst the signs of decline (*Romans 1 v.30*). If all goes well, children should obey their parents *and* parents should take care not to

"...exasperate your children,..." (Ephesians 6 v.4)

That is all very well, but some children (young or old) may find it hard to honour, obey and love parents who have not treated them well. What then? There is, I think, still a requirement for respect but yet the Bible is also honest about hurt. Forgiveness is a command of the Lord but sometimes a breakdown of relationship will happen.

Isaiah says that if it is possible that a mother could forget her child, God will not forget his children but will give comfort *(Isaiah 49 v.15, 66 v.13)*. Like the Father welcoming the prodigal son back home, there is a need for forgiveness on both sides at times.

They may infuriate, embarrass and disappoint us; they may need effort and care; they may have treated us badly. God would not want us hurt more than is right but it seems to be clear that God himself lives in community (the Trinity of Father, Son and Spirit) and places us in families for our good. In so far as we see that good, we are called to honour, respect, love and care for those who are our parents.

- How can you honour your parents in the way you communicate?
- How can you honour your parents in the way you act?
- How can you honour your parents in the way you remember them?

The Magi will end their long journey by the North windows of the church to bring their gifts to the infant Jesus. We hope that you will join us.



"We three kings of Orient are, ... "

Did you know...

The Epiphany marks the arrival of the Magi - the visit of the Wise Men to the baby Jesus. But who were the wise men? No one knows for certain. Saint Matthew calls them "Magi" and that was the name of an ancient caste of priests from Persia (present day Iran). It wasn't until the third century that they were called kings and assumed to be three, to correspond with the gifts they brought. Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wealth, clearly fit for a king. Frankincense represents worship and sacrifice, and myrrh was used for healing and embalming. Certainly, Jesus challenged and set right the way in which the world handled all three of these gifts.

Since the eighth century the Magi have had the names of Balthazar, Caspar and Melchior. It is a fascinating story of travels across a desert from the East towards an unknown destination. Their compass is a mysterious star and they carried valuable presents. The tale evolves into a grim struggle between good and evil and the Holy Family making a night-time escape, as refugees, to Egypt.

Saint Matthew ends the visit of the Wise Men by saying, "Having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road." The kings had paid homage, left gifts and they could not return to their old way of life.

The Christingle service is an opportunity for Church and School to support the work of The Children's Society as they reach out to the most vulnerable young people in our community. It has been working across Greater Manchester for over 120 years to bring about positive changes for children and young families. The vision is that poverty will no longer be a barrier for children to get a decent start in life and that child neglect is not an issue.

The Children's Society runs six centres in Oldham helping families who are facing difficult problems. Rob Jackson, North West area director says, "Health needs are not always immediately visible and nationally there is evidence that increasing numbers of children need mental health support."

Experience Symbols

Five years ago, Revd John Rosedale introduced the 'Experience' events of Easter, Pentecost and Christmas to the children of Holy Trinity School. Together with several members of the congregation, he has given an opportunity for classes to learn more about the Church's important Festivals. On several occasions, Christ Church Denshaw School has also joined in the activities.

In October, Revd John introduced us to a new venture he had assembled - 'Experience Symbols'. The format was similar with an introduction from Revd John after which the class was divided into groups to visit five stations around the church. The symbols found in the Bible and in church were linked with Christian beliefs and rituals – the Cross, bread and wine at Holy Communion, water and light at Baptism. Symbols of the natural world focused on the Old and New Testaments, such as the dove of the Ark, the eagle and the rooster which symbolises the acceptance of forgiveness through Jesus Christ.

At the end of each session, Revd John brought the groups together to conclude with a prayer and refreshments. He thanked the helpers - Revds Aaron and John (Faraday), Graham, Beverley, Peter and Dorothy for spreading their wings and explaining different aspects of Christian life through symbols.

Samuel Thomas Buckley 1990 - 2017

The service in church to celebrate Sam's life was conducted by the Revd Aaron Jackman and attended by over 200 people both young and old. In a moving service, Sam's family and friends told of a talented, enthusiastic young man who loved art and music and excelled at both in his short life.

Many people in the congregation remember Sam as a pupil at Holy Trinity School, including being student of the year and then later playing football, cricket and badminton at Saddleworth School. At Greenhead Sixth Form College in Huddersfield Sam started to express an interest in art which later led to being awarded a first-class honours degree in fine art from Slade, part of London University. In a loving tribute to his stepson, Peter Bryant explained how art and music were Sam's key interests but architecture, politics, cooking and antiques also played a large part in his life. Friends from school and college shared memories of happy times together and chose a recording of Sam's Band *Honeymagic* to be played at the service.

Peter paid tribute to Kryshia, Sam's mum, for her total love, care and devotion. Cystic fibrosis is a cruel disease which Sam bravely fought to the end.

Peter concluded his eulogy by saying, "This afternoon Sam will be lovingly laid to rest beside his father Andy, reunited after 17 years in Saddleworth Cemetery."



After an initial grant of £15,700 we have now been awarded £157,000 for urgent repairs to the spire and roof. Reflection and looking forward

It has been my custom in St Mary's magazine to reflect on the past month and look ahead to services and events in the coming month, and it should be possible to continue with that in future issues of The Grapevine. However, this time I thought I would say a few words about St Mary's by way of introduction, as one of the purposes of our new magazine is to help us get to know each other better, and to bring our parishes closer together.

History

St Mary's Church was consecrated in 1875 and had its own stipendiary Priests until 1996, followed by two non-stipendiary House for Duty Priests. I was ordained Priest in 2010, and since that time, I have served in the Benefice as an Ordained Local Minister (OLM), with most of my ministry being at St Mary's, which is my life long church.

A year ago, the new extension was built at St Mary's, so it now has a small kitchen and two toilets, which have made the building much more comfortable and it can be used more often and in more ways than previously.

Services

St Mary's has two services on most Sundays: Early Church for children and young families at 9:00am, and a more traditional service at 10:30am. There is also a midweek service of Holy Communion at 10:30am on Wednesdays, using the service from The Book of Common Prayer. On special occasions, both Sunday congregations worship together at 10:30am, and four or five times a year, children, families and staff from St Mary's School also take part in these special services, which help to reinforce the good relationships that exist between Church and School.

Finance and fundraising

As with all our parishes within the Church of England in Saddleworth, there is a constant focus on finances and fundraising, but St Mary's is particularly blessed to have a charity shop on the main road in Greenfield, which is a real asset to the church and to the whole community that is about far more important things than money: the

volunteers who work there, those who donate items for sale, and all the customers who benefit from the social interaction and from the genuine love and concern that is shown and shared.

Mission Action Planning

St Mary's, like all our parishes, is also working on its Mission Action Plan. Whilst this could easily be dismissed as a paper exercise, I hope and pray that in all our churches, it will be a real focus for spiritual growth and will help to increase our faith and build up our relationships not only within our churches, but also as we reach out with God's love into the wider community.

Family-friendly worship Wednesday Evenings at St Anne, Lydgate

Weekends are so full-on with all the other activities that families want to fit in. Church doesn't have to be on a Sunday. He is with us every day; we just have to find Him.

Emmaus Mossley

Saddleworth Churches celebrate twenty years since Emmaus Mossley first took in homeless residents.

St Anne Lydgate and Christ Church Friezland took the lead twenty years ago toward setting up an Emmaus Community in this area. Thanks to a national charity organised by Emmaus UK and the free conveyancing by a local firm of solicitors we were able to purchase Longlands Mill for £150,000 in August 1996. But we had very little other money and the insurance alone was £6,000 a year and the company stipulated many security requirements. It was here that church members in Saddleworth came to the rescue with fundraising. Emmaus Cambridge also helped from the October with £1,000 a month only four years after opening. We in turn are helping other needy projects from our solidarity funds. We were the sixth Emmaus Community in the UK, the first in the north. Now there are twenty nine communities so far.

It is twenty years since we took in our first homeless people and a book has been compiled from stories of people involved over those twenty years, available from Emmaus front counter for just £5.00 or go online for more information about Emmaus.

St Chad Saddleworth - Parish Church

Restoration and Development of St Chad's Church

In 2015-6, Saddleworth St Chad celebrated 800 years of continuous worship on the current site. As part of the special anniversary, church members began plans to improve and develop the church building to ensure that St Chad's Parish Church is a special place to visit, worship and treasure for many years to come. Plans include creating greater accessibility, a wider welcome for the community and more opportunities to offer arts and educational activities for all ages.

During 2016 we were shocked to learn that, in addition to the suggested development works, we needed to find hundreds of thousands of pounds to repair and restore the beautiful stained glass windows. After more than two hundred years, the iron rods within the stonework of the windows have corroded causing cracking and bowing of the stained glass. In order to undertake the necessary masonry repairs, the glass will have to be removed so adding to the cost. A recent, detailed survey of the whole church has identified that, in addition to the windows, extensive repair work is also required to the roof, ceiling and tower.

'Seeing is Believing'

St Chad's Church **Development Group is** leading on the task of securing resources and expertise to deliver a restoration and development project called 'Seeing is Believing'. Securing funds for this major project to preserve our special heritage and grow and strengthen St Chad's parish will require support from the wider community and a significant amount of money to be raised through grant applications and a fundraising campaign.



Special events have already taken place since the official launch in March 2017 and more are planned to cater for all ages and tastes.

Namibia 2017

As many of you will know Revd Sharon, Peter Burnley, Godfrey and I have recently returned from Namibia. We spent the first week in Windhoek, the capital city, where we made contact with lots of old friends. One such friend was Onesmus, who first came to Saddleworth as a student in 1992 and helped us form the link with the church of the Holy Spirit in Oshandi, which is the village where he grew up.

We also met Emma and Chris, who were both in the delegation from Oshandi to St Chad's in 2002 and who are now teachers. Emma teaches in a primary school on the edge of the township in Windhoek and Chris teaches in a secondary school in a town an hour's drive from Windhoek.

The highlight for Godfrey was meeting Louise and her 20 year old son, Godfrey. Louise came from Namibia to Bolton as a student and surprised us all by giving birth to a baby boy in the bathroom of a vicarage in Bolton. Godfrey is now in his second year of an Accountancy degree.

Before traveling to Oshandi we met with Bishop Luke and listened to the challenges he faces with the growth of the GAFCON Church in Namibia; please keep him and the Diocese in your prayers. On a Sunday in Oshandi, Revd Daniel had asked Sharon to celebrate. The church was full and we enjoyed an emotional and uplifting act of worship. It must have taken fifteen minutes for Sharon to bless all who came forward.

I had planned a community meeting to look at the weaknesses and concerns of OATIN / OMBOME OTO and to plan for the future. We held the meeting in the church and over a hundred people turned up: Headmen, Ombome volunteers, nursery teachers, orphans, and people who had benefited from our training, food parcels, and support over the years. People were very open and honest. It was humbling and very emotional to hear how our contributions have changed the lives of so many.

Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the OATIN project over the years. As a result of the drugs and food parcels, people are now able to work and support their families while living with HIV and AIDS.

Living conditions throughout the North are improving continuously. Some homes are now connected to the pipeline, and some have solar panels; this was the first time I have had the luxury of a fridge and electricity in Father Lazarus' home. New roads, schools and clinics are being built and people who had left for city life are now planning to return. It was the most positive and uplifting visit I have experienced. There is still much to do and our support, friendship and prayers have been asked for. Sarah Adams

Churches Together in Saddleworth (CTiS)



For many of us CTiS is a bit of a mystery, for some of us CTiS is a meeting that people go to but not us! And some of us, even though we have been in Saddleworth for many years, well ... we are wondering if this is something new as we have never heard of it before today.

Let me explain what CTiS is all about and how we do things in Saddleworth.

We know that there are many different Christian churches and denominations, but all have the same basic calling – to worship God, to share the good news about Jesus Christ and to work for the good of all people. In Saddleworth, as different churches, we seek to work together and support each other in the work that we do separately, deepening our fellowship with one another without losing that which makes us interestingly different.

Throughout the year we hold a variety of activities to which every Christian across Saddleworth is invited, including those in the Church of England, and to which anyone is welcome, regardless of their faith or lack of faith. These activities include worship, specific prayer, discussion groups and mission/outreach activities.

Worship

We have an annual Joint Service in January that coincides with the International Christian Unity Week. Some years this service is in the form of several services across Saddleworth but on **28th January 2018** there will be one large service in the Civic Centre. Many of the Church of England churches will be closed on that morning as a way of encouraging us to meet with other Christians from across the area. This really is a wonderful way of meeting other Christians from across Saddleworth and from other denominations.

Prayer

There are regular Saturday morning prayer meetings 8:30am to 10:00am. **Scary?** The scare is taken away by beginning the meeting with breakfast, usually cereal and toast which is followed by about an hour of prayer led by a minister or elder. Nobody is forced to pray aloud, the prayers cover not just Saddleworth but also the world and the ongoing situations that need our prayer and God's intervention. Put the following date in your diary:

Saturday 27th January 2018 at The Parish Centre, Lee Street, Uppermill.

Discussion Groups

We organise Lent Discussion Groups that run at different times and different locations across Saddleworth. The material used to start the discussions is usually discussed and agreed well in advance and then the group leaders prepare the material to ensure good conversations can be had. In addition, CTiS advertises other discussion groups that take place throughout the year, including a regular Theological Discussion Group.

Mission/Outreach Activities

These are usually advertised on church notice boards. Look out for the upcoming:

and become involved in proclaiming the gospel through word and action.

St Chad Saddleworth - Kilngreen

Kilngreen Notes

Welcome to Kilngreen Notes which will be appearing in every issue of The Grapevine so we can keep you up to date about what is going on.

My name is Janet Iles; I am a member of the congregation at Kilngreen and also an Authorised Lay Minister for Worship within the Benefice of Saddleworth. I have been writing the Kilngreen Notes for several years and it is our way of keeping everyone in touch with our Mission Church, which is the only Christian Church currently based in Diggle village.

Kilngreen Church is situated in Leeside just down the hill from the Diggle Hotel. When it was first built in 1870 it was Diggle School, and remained so for many years, until a more modern school was built on Sam Road.

Some of our older congregation members still remember their schooldays here including Revd Duncan Rhodes, our Ordained Local Minister, who has lived in Diggle all his life (although of course he was not a pupil when it was first built in 1870, I hasten to add!).

Because of its previous life as a school, it is a "multi-purpose" community building, housing both the church and a wide variety of groups and activities throughout the week.

Kilngreen Church



The church chancel is divided from the main area of the big hall by a slatted roll-down shutter, which protects the altar when the church is not in use, so that the building can be easily used for lots of other purposes. There are individual seats for the congregation, which means we can be very flexible about how we present services. Seats can be in rows, in a circle or semi-circle, or with tables, thus making for a creative and lively service of worship. The church is accessible for wheelchair users and has accessible toilet facilities.

Early Communion

Communion at an early age is encouraged at Kilngreen and children are always welcome to come to the communion rail to receive the bread



or a blessing with their parents. Hymns are mostly accompanied by the piano, played by Tracy or Cathie, with the occasional guest playing from Howard, or if all else fails we have a variety of CDs which cover all sorts of different hymns and songs for everyone to enjoy.

Sunday School

Kilngreen has a smaller room alongside the big hall which incorporates the kitchen. This is where Sunday School meets on most Sunday mornings for part of the service, joining the congregation each week at



the Eucharist. The Sunday School children have a board to display their work and they always tell everyone what they have been up to when they join us in the service. One of our younger congregation members, Rachel Diamond, has completed the Bishop's Certificate in Children's Ministry Level 1 and regularly works alongside the Sunday School teachers, ably assisted by her younger sister Hannah. Our current Sunday School children are all quite young and new families are always welcome to come along.

Weddings

Not everyone realises that Kilngreen Church is licensed for weddings and there have been several here over the last few years. Kilngreen makes a wonderful combined wedding and/ or reception venue.



Church Services

Our church services take place at 9:30am every Sunday. The first Sunday of the month is 'All Age Worship' when both the congregation and Sunday School worship together. Kilngreen has a long established group of Lay Worship Leaders who take turns to present this service throughout the year. They also include the children in the presentation of worship whenever they can.

The other Sundays of the month are communion services; these are taken by either Revd Duncan Rhodes or different members of the clergy team. If there is a 5th Sunday in the month we have joint services with the Parish Church and Parish Centre on a rotational basis.

Kilngreen as a Community Resource

St Chad's All Stars

Kilngreen is the home of the St Chad's All Stars theatre group. There is a full-sized stage in the hall and the All Stars put on a Spring Show and Pantomime each year. Everyone is welcome to become involved, although due to Safeguarding requirements, we cannot currently accept under 18s into our group. However there is no upper age limit. The emphasis is on everyone being a "star" and enjoying being part of the group, whether performing on stage, painting sets, or working backstage.

Diggle Ducklings

This group for young children and parents meets on Thursday mornings in the big hall.

Uniformed Organisations

Rainbows, Brownies, Beavers/Cubs and Guides meet at Kilngreen weekly during term-time.

Social Activity Groups and Events

At the moment there are Tai Chi classes weekly and also an Art Group that meets on Tuesday mornings. There are often one-off events held including Afternoon Teas, Wine Tasting, Children's Parties, Anniversary Parties, etc.

Kilngreen Supporters Club (KSC)

KSC raises funds to help pay for the upkeep of the building and holds several different events during the year.

Diggle Diamonds Christmas Party

Kilngreen hosts an annual Christmas Party for our Diamonds of Diggle (over 60s) and they enjoy a Christmas dinner and entertainment with Diggle Band, including carol singing. This is a very popular event and is generally well attended.

Diggle Blues Festival

In the last few years Kilngreen has also been part of the venues for Diggle Blues Festival which is held in June. The Kilngreen Supporters Club provides a barbecue and bar at this event.

Diggle School Concerts

Diggle School have also held several concerts at Kilngreen in previous years.

St Chad's Annual Christmas Fair

The Christmas Fair takes place in early November and includes Santa's Grotto which is always worth a visit.

A view from behind bars – Safe and Secure?

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The Safer Custody Department of the prison does what it says on the tin: aims to keep people safe whilst in custody.

Jason had a bad spell a few months ago and was placed on an Assessment, Care in Custody & Teamwork (ACCT) document to monitor him on a regular basis to try to stop him from self-harming or taking his suicidal thoughts further.

He came through it and seemed to be picking up in mood. He got on with his job on the wing. Then things took a dive again. In the space of a few days he heard that his mother had been diagnosed with terminal cancer and his partner was moving in with his brother and taking the kids with her.

You can't write the scripts. His sentence was for arson. After a threat to his own family he attempted to set fire to property. He failed but, whilst trying to flee, was knocked down by a vehicle was seriously injured.

His latest piece of news drove him to what some officers feel were attention-seeking behaviours: rather botched attempts at injuring himself, first with a jump, then with a kettle. I spare the exact details.

When these things happen, Safer Custody have a duty to protect the prisoner but that can mean locking them in a 'safe cell' i.e. one with reinforced perspex at the bars which allows constant observation.

ACCT reviews are conducted regularly between the prisoner, senior officer or Governor, Community Psychiatric Nurse (CPN), and chaplain. On the occasion I attended, Jason was talking about his expected visit that afternoon with his mother and sister. The prison staff had found him so unpredictable that they were wary of letting the visit happen in the usual hall in case problems were created for other visitors or staff. The CPN spoke out: "I don't think the visit can be facilitated". The safer custody officer agreed that it was 'not safe'. Jason stormed out, telling them they might as well take his visit from him because he had lost everything else.

I went to see him a few minutes later. "They're not really going to stop my Mum from visiting are thev?" he said, almost in tears, "She's the one who knows what I need to do to feel better". We talked about his past and about his sense of having lost everything and how his mum had been his rescuer. Now he felt that she, the one person he could trust, was about to die. I tried to help him to see that she needed him as well and to help him to think about some verses from the Bible. 'The Lord is my shepherd, I have everything I need' is a great statement of trust from someone who later on talks about his enemies. The Psalm speaks of walking through pleasant places and dark shadows of death. It seems right for plenty of prisoners who are desperate.

I urged the people responsible to reconsider his visit. If he was intent on killing himself then at least, it seemed, he might have had a chance to see his mum first and maybe she would help him to think things were better rather than worse. At least one other officer saw things the same way. The visit went ahead and Jason is still with us. So, for now, is his mum.

Others have written of how our need to keep people safe is more about how frightened **we are** to face the unknown and the risks in life than about genuine and necessary compassion. At times, risks help us to assess our capabilities, prove ourselves and take us into new places that we would not once have managed; they can, when handled rightly, give us greater self-worth and new possibilities.

The balance is tricky, undoubtedly. The Prison Service has to keep people as safe as possible especially when things have been unstable beforehand. Yet the man who is depressed will not always be drawn out of depression when he is compelled to stay isolated for his own security. How to work out the balance is just one of those everyday issues faced by the staff in a demanding situation.

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Churches Together in Saddleworth - Vacancy for Christian Aid Secretary

Bright Futures School

Bright Futures School (BFS) in Grasscroft brings a new approach to autism education. We use a 'guiding' (derived from the autism intervention 'Relationship Development Intervention' RDI) to work **directly on** some of the difficulties at the heart of autism **instead of working round them** like most other schools.



We know that autism is a developmental disorder. Children with autism do not master (or only partially master) key developmental milestones such as social referencing, joint attention, perspective-taking, and emotional regulation. All of these are crucial for friendships and relationships, independence, and employment.

We know that if children do not master these milestones, they become rigid thinkers who find it difficult to cope with uncertainty and change. This is why children with autism have high levels of anxiety and are prone to what some parents describe as 'meltdowns'; they are constantly coming up against uncertainty and change and are unable to cope with it.

Everyday uncertainties include (for some children) simple things like a change in the route of their journey to school, new clothes or shoes, a new teacher at school...... things most typically developing children wouldn't bat an eyelid at. If a child with autism is unable to cope with any type of uncertainty, they react in one of three ways – flight, fight or freeze. What we see as 'autistic behaviours' (avoidance, withdrawal and meltdown) are actually an expression of this anxiety and inability to cope.

Fear and feelings of incompetence make us all anxious, but typically developing people have had thousands of experiences that have led to memories of competence and success. They have had these experiences during their early years in the special 'guiding' relationship they have with their parents. It is this 'guiding' relationship that our staff replicate in school to help students master missed milestones.

Our pupils say...

"I enjoy working with staff at BFS. I enjoy the activities and there isn't any other place I'd rather be. In my old school I was bullied and the teachers didn't do anything. At Bright Futures School there isn't any bullying and when we fall out the teachers help us to understand each other and to make friends again."

"At my old school, staff and other pupils used to wind me up. I used to get into a lot of trouble. I was excluded a few times and eventually I stopped going. It's not like that at Bright Futures School. Staff understand me and help me and I've made friends here. I like my work placement and I like getting ASDAN certificates."



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
