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The Rector writes...

The Story of Holy Week and Easter doesn't make easy bed-time reading for children or adults. It's not like 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears' or 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'. It is a difficult story of betrayal, cruelty, suffering. We are tempted to make it palatable by dressing it up in chocolate, spring lambs and bunny rabbits.

Easter is the celebration of the greatest story. It's the story of an empty tomb. It's a story familiar to us in a world of wars and battles, victories and defeats. In this story, the Easter story, it is about Jesus and his defeat not of armies and soldiers but the defeat of the power of sin and death to control and imprison us. Easter is a celebration of death and sin being conquered and new possibilities; a new story arising from the dark depths of despair and anguish. It is a story of self-giving love and liberation; a story of freedom.

Much of our lives we think we are already free. Personal choice is the god of the age. It is the god that says we are free to have what we want, that we can do all things, achieve all things, be whoever we want; that if we satisfy our cravings, our longings, we can find happiness. But it's a lie. We are massively deceived. We're not free at all. We are enslaved to advertising, to social media, gossip and rumour. We are enslaved to the dictates of our mobile phones, of our bodily cravings and the compulsion to spend money to buy things to make us fulfilled and happy.

On the Cross, Jesus Christ bears the weight of the sin of the world. It is where we unload our baggage; where he reveals to us the shackles and deceptions of our lives and loves us back to life.

I wish you all a Holy and Happy Easter.





A view behind bars - Living with the Mafia



There are times when I realise I've become used to the clang of the gates and the shabby walls and I have forgotten that this is a prison. Although I'm not sure where else I would find myself chatting with half a dozen men at a time. I went to an all Girls' school; this was never normal life. We saw two men on a regular basis; one taught English and the other Physics. Any others were Sixth formers from the Boys' school across the road and would usually be sent back very speedily.

Sometimes I wonder if I'm in a parallel universe when I remember that the guys, who have just offered me a cup of tea ("Normal or red berries, Miss?") and a toasted spam sandwich are the criminals who have wreaked havoc in society and family life. The wing cleaner, who cleans the officers' station, has access to the microwave so elevenses can be guite an event!

I'm brought sometimes to shocking recollection when I hear their stories. Matt and I talked for half an hour, perched on the snooker table, about how he is surprised about himself at the moment. The surprise is that he can sense he is changing. Instead of being care-less for what he has done to people, he is feeling guilty. Instead of thinking only of himself, he is beginning to think about how other people may feel.

He told me how he grew up with a mother who was a 'proper born-again Christian believer' but how she gave up her faith when her father was shot and took to drugs for solace instead. Matt grew up in a family he described as being like the Mafia gangsters and he found it exciting and a good world to be in.

Now things feel different. He suffers with the guilt that although he didn't take the shot, his actions in leaving a gun in a house where he knew a teenage boy would find it, led to the boy's death. In a show-off trick to his friends, the faulty trigger went off in the boy's hands and he died.

I am glad Matt feels guilty rather than casual about his actions. Yet there is a fine line between the guilt which weighs down, leads to remorse and ends in bitter hopelessness and the guilt which leads to repentance, a 'Godly sorrow' and a changed life that works for good. Judas knew about that guilt which weighs down when he betrayed Jesus and hung himself. Whereas Peter, who abandoned his Lord, found a new purpose after the Resurrection.

I want to pray that Matt will cope with the knowledge that he can't put the past right but can make the future different. Perhaps that's already begun, as he told me that he'd recently decided to stop the secret handling of the drugs that are rife in prison (no, I don't know how they get there) and which generate an income for him on a small level. What changed him? Seeing a man fall under the influence and realising he had contributed to that state of body and mind.

Matt is thinking, feeling and acting a little differently. He's currently on a Christian Alpha course and I hope he keeps looking forward and allowing himself to be surprised at the changes in himself.

Just a couple of weeks earlier I responded to a request from a prisoner in the Segregation Unit, to pray and light a candle with him to remember his brother who died several years ago. He gets depressed at this time of year. He was quiet, polite, grateful and chatted about his boredom. He could ask for a jigsaw but said he hadn't the patience for it. A couple of days later he had given in, started one off but given up before he had even got the edge finished!

Later, I sat in on a meeting concerning him where it emerged that he had formerly been one of the most high-security risk prisoners in the country with his revenge attack having been all over the national news. He, it would seem, has softened with time.

At times this is a world of horrible crimes. We have to hold out hope that there is, amongst the power for evil, the power to change for good.

The Ascension of Jesus the Christ

This is one of the earliest images of the Ascension. It comes from the sixth century Rabbula Gospels completed in AD 586 at the Monastery of St John of Zagba, in what is now modern Syria.



Images of the Ascension often show two parts:

- † an upper (Heavenly) part
- † and a lower (Earthly) part.

In Eastern Orthodox icons like this one, at the centre on earth stands the Virgin Mary, her arms outstretched to heaven and surrounded by the Apostles. On earth, two heavenly angels make a link between the two worlds, both seem to be instructing their groups of people, one pointing heavenwards, the peoples' faces raised, looking at the risen Christ, the other deep in conversation and

teaching. In the realm above Christ stands surrounded by angels, his right hand raised in blessing, his left holding a scroll or perhaps the Gospel. Note that, in this image, there are saints and angels both in heaven and on earth.

Ascension Day is celebrated on the sixth Thursday (40 days) after Easter Day. It signifies the time after the Easter resurrection, and the appearances of the risen Lord, when Christ leaves the earthly realm and enters the heavenly realm. In Luke's account (Luke 24 v50) this seems to be continuous with his resurrection. In Acts 1, the event takes place after a period of 40 days; after talking to the apostles he is lifted up and a cloud takes him out of their sight. John's gospel has several references to ascension in Jesus' own words, including,

"No one has ascended into heaven but he who descended from heaven, the son of man" (John 3 v13)

and his words to Mary Magdalene in the resurrection garden,

"Do not hold me, for I have not yet ascended to my father..." (John 20:17).

For me, the ascension shows the completion of Christ's earthly work. He has been fully human in order to show us *the ways of God* and *the way to God*. This work of His is now done.

Soon (at Pentecost or Whitsun), He will send His spirit, the Holy Spirit, to continue that work in each of us. It is rather wonderful to think that Christ's risen spirit is with each of us: teaching, leading, forgiving, loving.

Christ's Ascension links us umbilically with God the Father, the two realms, earthly and heavenly, forever joined together.

Pentecost (Whitsun) - The Coming of the Holy Spirit

Pentecost is the alternate name for the Jewish festival of Shavuot. Shavuot is one of the Three Jewish Pilgrimage Festivals and celebrates the revelation of the Five Books of the Torah (the first five books of the Old Testament in the Christian Bible) by God to Moses and to the Israelites at Mount Sinai. It happens fifty days after the

Passover and Exodus from Egypt. It also commemorates the wheat harvesting in the Land of Israel and takes place in the Feast of Weeks.

It was during this festival following the death and resurrection of Jesus, when Jerusalem would have been full of visitors, that God's Holy Spirit came in abundance for everyone. Up until this time God's Holy Spirit appears to only have been for individuals. Throughout the Old Testament we read of people having the Spirit of God upon them, but it seems to be for individuals for a specific task.

The Day of Pentecost after the resurrection of Jesus changed the way that God was working in the world. On the day of Pentecost, The Book of Acts tells us that a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where the disciples were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them.



The disciples received God's Holy Spirit and were now speaking through God's power not their own. For instance, Peter spoke to the crowds and in response three thousand people came to believe in the death and resurrection of Jesus, repented of their sins and were baptised (Acts 2 v14 - 41). Through the Book of Acts there is one example after another of the Holy Spirit being at work

through God's people and of people not only becoming believers but also of miracles being performed by the believers. These miracles, alongside the sharing of the Gospel outside of Israel fulfil the promise of Jesus that his followers would do more than Him.

So what does this mean for us?

God's Holy Spirit empowered the early church and when each of us is confirmed the Bishop prays that we will receive the Holy Spirit. We should no longer be working in our own strength but in the strength of the Holy Spirit. This shows itself in different ways, first our behaviour towards our fellow Christians and all around us should be Christ-like. In Galatians Paul tell the readers that when we truly live by the Spirit our behaviour is noted for Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self Control. Secondly, God's Holy Spirit endows us with gifts for building up the church. There are many gifts that we have, perhaps do not recognise, and do not use. Paul in his letters lists those gifts, the 'practical' and the 'spiritual'. The 'practical' gifts include teaching, preaching, administration and hospitality whilst the 'spiritual' include healing, prophecy and faith.

The purpose of these gifts is to build up the church. Let us seek the grace of God's Holy Spirit to enable us to serve him fruitfully in our churches and community.

The Trinity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit

The first Sunday after Pentecost is Trinity Sunday – the festival occasion for all churches dedicated to the Holy Trinity – God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. The word Trinity comes from the Latin word meaning "three" or a "group of three", but in this connection it does not mean three separate beings but one Being who makes himself known in three different ways. Christians believe that:

- † God the Father is the creator and source of all;
- † God the Son (Jesus) lived on earth and showed in his life the nature of God.
- † God the Holy Spirit (or the Holy Ghost) lives within us and equips us to serve God.

"Holy! Holy! Holy! Lord God Almighty" – this is possibly the best hymn to be sung on Trinity Sunday, addressing direct and simply, "God in three Persons." It combines images from Psalm 63 in the Old Testament and the saints in the Book of Revelations in the New Testament.

This wonderful hymn was not published until after the death of its writer, Bishop Reginald Heber (1783 -1826).

Holy! Holy! Lord God Almighty! God in three Persons, blessed Trinity!

The Benefice has had a Church link with Forsa (Finland) for several years. You may remember that Esa, the Rector of the Lutheran Church in Forsa, and some of the Parishioners, have joined with us before at some of our Churches. Tithing

The congregation of St. Thomas's has pledged to give away one-tenth of its income to different charities, known in the Bible as "tithing".

Every three years the PCC reviews our supported charities and makes a decision as to which ones we shall support for the next three years. We support:



Many years ago St. Thomas's pledged £10,000 to build one of the first houses for Kampala Children's Centre (KCC).

The house, named "House of Peace" is home to a dozen children and their housemother and our connection still continues as once a month we sell cakes after the morning service in order to provide her with some "spending money". Last month, for example, about £90 was raised from this cake sale.

The more musical of the children at KCC have been formed into a choir, called "Destiny Africa" and have performed in St Thomas's, the Civic Centre, Uppermill and even in 10 Downing Street, as well as in Europe and the USA.





This is a charity whose vision is "a just world, with no street children." By definition, street children are those vulnerable children and young people who, for a variety of reasons, such as the necessity of earning a living, escaping from abuse, neglect and violence or as a result of natural disasters, have no place to call home and must take refuge on the streets, the only means to earn an income.

The United Nations estimate of the numbers of street children is hundreds of millions, although there are no accurate figures available. These are the children invisible to the world, living without rights or protection, who quickly become prey to drugs and alcohol, whose future is bleak and whose life expectancy is very low.



The Leprosy Mission (TLM) is an international Christian charity caring for people affected by leprosy and was founded in 1874, motivated and inspired by Christ's ministry of compassion towards those people suffering from leprosy. Working in over 30 countries, with around 2,000 staff worldwide, TLM is treating people affected by leprosy through its own hospitals and programmes and those it assists.

TLM aims to meet the physical, spiritual, social and mental needs of people affected by leprosy, whilst working towards the eventual eradication of the disease. It works in partnership with churches, voluntary agencies, national governments and international bodies, such as the World Health Organisation, to combat leprosy. It is supported by the voluntary contribution of churches and support groups around the world and has an international budget of nearly £10 million.



This charity, founded by John Kirkby, now its International Director, came from his own bitter experiences of being in severe debt and the freedom that comes from being debt-free.

It is out of thankfulness to God that he has devoted his life to enabling many people to become debt-free via a team of Debt Counsellors. As well as debt counselling, this charity runs Life Skills courses, Job Clubs and Release Groups and 10,000 people have learned to manage their money through the CAP Money Course. Taking clients away on a short break helps them feel renewed and donating food hampers at Christmas is a real treat for folk on a strict budget.

In order to further this work, many at St. Thomas's have chosen to become CAP Life-Changers, whereby they give an amount monthly to help finance the operation.



Open Doors has sprung from a simple, one-man expedition to a "Socialist" youth congress in Poland in 1955 by a Dutch Christian, who has come to be known as Brother Andrew. He spent years smuggling Bibles into the Communist bloc countries. Now Open Doors is worldwide and the current concern is principally about North Korea, the most dangerous place in the world to be a Christian. Since 2002 it has been number one on the Open Doors World Watch List, the annual ranking of the fifty countries where Christians face the most extreme persecution

Any belief in an authority higher than their leader is viewed as deeply threatening by the state. Tens of thousands of Christians are incarcerated in labour camps and thousands more keep their faith in Christ a complete secret, even from their own children. And yet, incredibly, the church in North Korea is growing. Open Doors estimates that there are at least 300,000 believers in the country, despite its seeming impossible. If you want to read the story of Hannah who, with her family, was imprisoned for her faith in Jesus, visit:



MCM was founded in 1837 and exists to spread the Gospel to underprivileged members of the Manchester community.

The Dawn Project comprises a small group who visits five residential homes in Salford, singing hymns the residents remember and giving short Gospel talks. The Narrowgate Night Shelter ministers to the homeless. The aim of the Shelter is to help people practically as well as sharing the Gospel with them. Groundbreakers delivers assemblies and lunch clubs across Manchester, including Oldham and Saddleworth, and its aim is "to make real the Christian faith – to allow the children to understand they are important to God."

MCM is also helping to deliver the Neighbourhood Prayer Project, whereby Christian folk undertake to pray for their neighbours and their community.

familiar face in Denshaw as his children attend Christ Church School and he is a regular at Friday assemblies, so not strictly speaking a guest but a good friend of the parish.

School Links

As school finishes on Maundy Thursday (29th March) this year due to the early Easter, there will be an Easter Service in place of the usual assembly at 9:15am. Although the service is primarily for parents, anyone who wishes to attend from the parish will be very welcome and we are sure they will enjoy the service and appreciate the enthusiasm shown by the children. They love taking part in these special services.

Experience Easter

One of the Year 6 children at Christ Church School and a regular worshipper at our church has written a piece for The Grapevine about what Easter means to her and how it is celebrated both at school and within her own family.



"Easter at Christ Church and Christ Church School is an important time of the year for us all. We especially enjoy Experience Easter, when we learn about Easter. An interesting way of doing this is by thinking about different parts of the Easter story. In my family we think about Easter and my mum and sister choose something hard to give up over Lent, this year it is chocolate. I try and not give anything up, but aim to do something nice each day as an act of kindness.

"At school this year, we will be thinking about Palm Sunday, and how Jesus arrived on a donkey to a crowd shouting 'Hosanna' and waving Palm Leaves. About how Jesus is a King but to be a King does not mean you need to ride on a stallion and live in a palace, it is about doing good things and being a good person.

"To remember the Last Supper we all sit together in a circle and share bread to remember what Jesus did for us. We share grapes instead of wine and think about how we can remember Jesus each time we eat and to be thankful.

"We learn how Jesus prayed at Gethsemane, we all say The Lord's Prayer. We say The Lord's Prayer every day after assembly at school and in church, we all say The Lord's Prayer after a blessing from Reverend John. It reminds us that God's will must be done and to do this we must speak to the Lord in all we do.

"Good Friday will be remembered in Experience Easter by thinking about the Death, Burial and Resurrection of Jesus. Last year we did this by thinking how Jesus suffered and what would make us suffer, people thought about things that would make them suffer such as if they couldn't have electronics, and sweets! When I think about what would make me suffer, I think about what it would be like if I had no food or if I had no friends. Good Friday helps us to think about how there is sadness in the Crucifixion but joy and excitement in the

Resurrection. In previous years we have really enjoyed going to Holy Trinity to share Experience Easter, this year we are looking forward to the event being held in our own church which is quite exciting.

"Easter Sunday is when we celebrate the life of Jesus and his Resurrection into Heaven. We all love Easter eggs and by sharing chocolate eggs as gifts we remember that Jesus was sent to us as a gift from God his father. At home we always have an Easter egg hunt in the garden and have a nice lunch together as a family after we have celebrated Holy Communion at Christ Church.



"My favourite Easter quote is from Luke 24 v3-6. It reminds me that Jesus is no longer in the tomb because he is alive. The empty tomb surprised Jesus's friends, but it was a good surprise. The good news of Easter is that Jesus is alive today. By rising, he gave us good gifts such as forgiveness and peace."

On Maundy Thursday we will hold our usual Maundy Eucharist and Stripping of the Altar at 7:00pm and on Good Friday there will be 'Reflections for Good Friday' at 11:00am. There will be one service on Easter Sunday, our Easter Eucharist (BCP) at 10:30am. All services will be led by Revd Philip Williamson.

Whit Friday

Looking further ahead to May and hopefully some warmer weather, Whit Friday is 25th May this year and we are grateful to Philip Beckwith who has once again organised a top class band from Switzerland to play for our Whit walk. The bands always really enjoy the morning in Denshaw and it's great to hear such good playing echo through the village. Again this is a joint event when school children and staff join us for the walk, the smaller ones returning to school before tacking the climb up Oldham Road.

How passion flowers got their name

Why is the passion flower known as the passion flower? This beautiful climbing plant that grows in many of our gardens is not native to the UK, but comes from South America. It was first discovered by Spanish missionaries working there, centuries ago. Drawings were sent back to Europe, and in 1609 an Italian priest

interpreted the flower to represent the crucifixion, otherwise known as the Passion.





He decided that the five petals and five sepals could represent the ten disciples who remained steadfast (Judas and Peter both abandoned Jesus). The corona could be seen as Jesus's crown of thorns. The stigma could be seen as the cross or nails, and the five stamens could be seen as the number of wounds Jesus received.

Holy Trinity Dobcross

A "Dedication of Textiles" Service Sunday 13th May at 10:30am

For some time, the Parochial Church Council (PCC) has been working on a project to enhance our worship by renewing and replacing various pieces of textiles such as the communion rail kneeler and well-used Eucharist linens. After many discussions, it was decided to commission an ecclesiastical design specialist, Polly Meynell to visit Holy Trinity and offer advice and guidance. Her portfolio of work can be seen on her website:

She commented that the beautiful gold-leafed woodwork at the front of church, mainly the pulpit, vicar and reader's stalls, is covered by seasonal falls. This led our thoughts and discussions to adopt a way forward. Designs were drawn up and displayed for consultation with the congregation. Eventually churchwarden, Paul Wooding, was able to complete the necessary documents with the diocese to get permission to make the change.

The altar table is the focus when looking towards the East window. Thanks to the skill of Roy Hopkinson, the table has been refurbished to enable five new textile panels to be in place. A gilding specialist has applied gold leaf to the scalloped edges (in a similar manner to the reredos).

The altar panels have a design to reflect the shape and colour of the Saddleworth hills and skies. Complementary designs for the altar central panel, chalice veils, burses and stoles follow the church's seasons.



The sanctuary rail kneeler and choir stall pew cushions are being introduced into church "in memory of Barbara Hopkinson" who passed away in 2014.

The Venerable Cherry Vann, Archdeacon of Rochdale, has accepted our invitation to bless and introduce these textiles into church.

Following the service we will be holding a 'picnic' in the narthex.

The churchwardens and the PCC offer a warm invitation to join them for this special dedication service and stay afterwards for a shared 'Picnic'.


Trinity Sunday (see also Page 11)

It is proving popular with parents, grandparents and carers, as well as with the children. Baby changing facilities are provided in Church. Car parking is available at the side of Church and also at the Church Hall. Our now earlier opening time of 9:30am has been much welcomed and our dedicated team of volunteers from within our church community provide a fun and supportive environment.

Come along and have a great time with our: bouncy castle; ball pit; train sets; lots of sit-and-rides and a slide for active toddlers. We also have a safe area for young babies with lots of cushions and mats for a comfy, cosy, relaxing space. There is a different safe space for older babies (crawlers) and another area for those who enjoy Creative Crafts such as colouring or playdough and this sometimes includes a themed crafting table. There are also lots of books and shape jig-saws for those who want some quieter time.

Drinks and snacks (toast, fresh fruit and sometimes cheese or sausages) are available for the children. Freshly-brewed coffee and tea and a home-bake are on offer for adults. All this is provided for a voluntary donation of £3 which goes directly to support our Church.

The children especially look forward to 11:15am when we start our singing session. With lots of musical instruments to hand, everyone joins in and makes a joyful sound. Our Team Curate often comes along to close the session with a short 'Thank You' prayer.

Junior Church

Junior Church is a lively group for children of all ages, currently ranging from under 2 to 13 years old. We have around forty children registered and a regular attendance each week of around twenty. There are toys available for younger children and a group specifically aimed at older children (aged 10 and above). During term time, each week involves activities such as crafts, drama, games, discussions, baking, prayers and stories, which parallel the main church service or are based on special occasions.

Every week we participate in part of the service and once a month we are all in church for the whole service. This is a slightly-shorter integrated worship specifically aimed at children and the young at heart. Junior Church members are regularly given the opportunity to be more involved in church worship by serving, reading during the service, writing prayers, and talking to the rest of the congregation about what they do in Junior Church. We also run an introduction to communion course for primary school aged children every few years, culminating in a service celebrating their 'first communion'.

Each October one of our Junior Church members is crowned Harvest Queen/King. Throughout the year they, along with their retinue, represent our church by visiting other churches in the area and they are a key part of the Whit Friday parade.

Whit Friday Band Contest

Spring is in the air and throughout the valley plans are underway for this year's Whit Friday Band Contest.

The Friezland Contest has been

attracting bands for thirty six years and is unique in being hosted by a church. Christ Church Friezland starts the day with the Whit Walks and in the afternoon prepares for their Band Contest.

Our contest attracts the more traditional audience with a family friendly atmosphere and no tolerance of rowdy behaviour. The atmosphere is enhanced by the compact location, the sheltered seating available during inclement weather, the indoor meals and outdoor barbeque, the children's stall and a real ale bar.

We expect around fifty bands from far and wide to be marching and playing throughout the evening; last year's winner even came from Scandinavia.

The twenty church volunteers will organize, set up, marshal, serve, dismantle and tidy up the event with any surplus funds helping to maintain the structure of the church building.

The aim of the organizers is to produce an opportunity for the local community to socialize, to appreciate traditional brass band music and to relax in convivial surroundings.

Baptism Matters Godparents' Sunday

This is a response to research undertaken on behalf of the Archbishops' Council looking at parents' real experiences and expectations around the baptism of their child. In 2016, Godparents' Sunday took place for the first time with resources made available to help create a great day of welcome and celebration.

In 2018, it will take place on 6th May, but you can celebrate the role of godparents at any time of year, if you wish. One of the biggest findings of the research was that godparents really, really matter to families. Godparents are part of family life for all the years ahead; a relationship that will last into adulthood and beyond. Setting apart a Sunday to celebrate and pray for this special relationship is a great opportunity to share with families and to ask for God's blessing on godparents and godchildren everywhere. We are looking to recognise this initiative this year and more will follow.

Reflection and looking forward

By the time you read this, spring will have arrived, and we will be celebrating a joyful Eastertide, but as I write, snow keeps fluttering past the window and it is incredibly cold outside. Every year the seasons reveal God's continuing goodness towards us and how wonderful it is that Easter always occurs in spring, alongside so many other reminders of new life and new beginnings.

As we look beyond Easter, we will be holding our Annual Parochial Church Meeting at 10:00am on Sunday 29th April. Soon afterwards, we will celebrate Ascension Day on 10th May, with a service at 7:30pm at St Mary's, when we look forward to welcoming friends from the other churches in our Benefice.



Ascension Day is St Mary's patronal festival, as the church was consecrated on Ascension Day, 6th May, 1875, by Bishop James Fraser, the second Bishop of Manchester. St Mary's was one of 99 churches that he consecrated during his time in office, so the Diocese must have grown considerably under his leadership.

Ascension Day is, of course, quite closely followed by Pentecost or Whit. On Whit Friday, 25th May, our day will begin with a service at Church at 9:15am, and then we will walk onto Road End to meet our friends from Greenfield Methodist Church for our



outdoor service, before enjoying our joint walk of witness around the village. Whit Friday is a real community event and always attracts people from far and wide. It's also an opportunity for the Church to witness to its faith in our great God, and it's always a joy to see everyone gathering to walk and worship together.

But our Christian witness shouldn't just happen on Whit Friday. The reports about St Mary's Charity Shop and Early Church, Pulse, and other groups that meet, are a part of our on-going work, mission and ministry at St Mary's, and I am grateful to all those who serve God and his people both from and within our church building.

And there have been many who have served at St Mary's during its 143 year history, who are remembered with love and gratitude. From our Book of Remembrance for April and May, we particularly remember Norah Bourne, Hilda Helena Maclean, Duncan Maclean, Kathleen Pilkington, Harry Parkin, Tom Partington, Edith Elizabeth Brassay, Priscilla Forber and John Brian Buckley. As we give thanks for them and their lives, we also pray for their families and friends who love and miss them.

"Glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours. May it be so for ever. Let this covenant now made on earth be fulfilled in heaven. Amen."



Wellsprings

A bit of background (for our new readers)

Wellsprings was developed by a group of people from Rochdale and Saddleworth with friends from the UK and beyond. Since 1991 they have been engaged in a growing programme of solidarity, help and friendship with the *campesino* community of El Tular, El Salvador (in Central America).

The Trust is supported by a large group of committed friends here and also works with a local management committee in El Tular chosen by the people, and with a partner development organisation, the Asociacion El Balsamo, in the capital, San Salvador.

The main thrusts of the work in El Tular can be summarised as:

"To promote charitable objectives to the relief of poverty, the advancement of education and the preservation and protection of good health"

The encounter began in 1991 about the time of the signing of the peace treaty which followed a brutal repression of the Salvadoran people. The main features of the development side have been friendship, some economic improvement, educational development, emergency help (earthquake, hurricanes, drought etc.) and health (including clean water).

Latest News

Christmas Activities in El Tular

In the last days of December we provided a number of activities for the whole of our community, especially El Tular's youth and children.

Activity 1

On Christmas Eve, after the children have visited all their families for the traditional pre-Christmas Eve breakfast, most of them gathered at the front of the church where there was a football game after which the parents shared presents and food with the boys and girls.

These events combine with other activities which

happen at this time, such as the supper which follows the mass in the Church.

The food for all these is prepared by the women of the community who come together on this day of festivity.

Activity 2

We have a cultural activity in our community which happens in the last weekend of December. Several



children and young people felt moved to initiate us into some of the traditional dances and the pastoralia suitable for our times.

Activity 3

Following on from various activities a group of young people with some friends from our neighbouring village, Los Pintines, came together to construct a "Marimba", the traditional musical instrument of our people, and play traditional music on it.

Activity 4

This is how these activities are developing in our community in the context of our patronal festivals. Traditional dances, music and choral songs with groups of children and young people.

Every year we are able to put on these events because the people *unite* to bring them about.

One of the traditional dances of the patronal festivals is called the Spotted Calf. This year it was put on to the music of the marimba by these artists from our community.

Thank you also to Jim Hall who led us in a reflection on St Mark's Gospel Chapter 12, the story of the five sparrows. He made us all realise how special we are to God; if God cares so much for an insignificant sparrow, just think how much he cares for us!

The Prosecco and Praise group had its first meeting in Java, six of us had a great time getting to know each other better (mainly over hot chocolate - it was too cold for Prosecco). We also spent some time thinking about the story from Luke and reflected on how special we are to God.


After the service we process with the other churches along High Street to the viaduct. We return to Uppermill village and end our walk at the Parish Centre on Lee Street.



Book review - Revd Aaron Jackman

The Way to Love, though small in stature, is a book which attempts to tackle some of life's biggest questions. Written by Indian Jesuit priest, Father Anthony De Mello, as a series of short meditations, each chapter focuses on a teaching of Jesus and expands on them to offer simple, yet profound insights into the meaning of love.

In an age where the much-needed and deeply spiritual practice of inner contemplation has been hijacked by money-making populist 'gurus', this book brings things back to basics, reminding us that the true path to love and freedom lies in the act of letting go of attachments - to things, to people, and (as Christ demonstrated in his death and resurrection) even to life itself.



A book for the contemplative person who is eager to ask honest questions about themselves and the way they experience reality. This is recommended as a helpful way to begin exploring contemplative prayer or meditation.

Kilngreen Notes

As I write these notes the snow is falling on what has been reported as the coldest week of the year! Hopefully by the time you are reading this we may be seeing spring!

New Year's Day Service

As has been the custom in Diggle since 2000, a New Year's Day Service was held on the car park at The Hanging Gate which was attended by members of Kilngreen and many villagers from Diggle. This was Revd Duncan Rhodes's final public service and he talked about love and the importance of this in our lives. We were joined by members of Diggle Band who accompanied the hymns and prayers to welcome in 2018.

January Family Service Goodbye 2017 Welcome to 2018

January Family service was led by Janet and Geoff Iles and was on the theme of letting go of the old year and welcoming the new one. Everyone in the congregation was given a square of paper and a square of card, and asked to write something on the paper that they wanted to leave behind from 2017. These pieces of paper were then screwed up and put into a bucket to be thrown away.

Everyone was then asked to write something on their card that they would like to either achieve or see happen in 2018. These were not for sharing but were small enough to put inside a diary or a wallet. We were invited to keep this and look at it later in the year to see if we had been able to achieve the aim written on our cards. We were also invited to write on a flip chart anything we would like to pray for in this new year and these were included in the prayers.

February Family Service

February Family Service was led by Val Stocker, Tracy Waller and Anne Wilson. Val welcomed everyone to the service, and asked each person to choose a small stone, write their name on it and keep it for later in the service. She then explained the theme of the service which had three strands:

What is the Church?

What is the purpose of the Church today?

How can we spread the Good News to others?

Val explained that there are three words we can use to represent these:

"UP" purpose to Worship God in our Church;

"IN" purpose to create our community here on

earth like the one in heaven;

"OUT" purpose to share the Good News of Jesus

vith others.



When we come together as a Church we begin with Jesus at the centre, and the cross reminds us of Jesus and his resurrection, and we are his "living stones". The Church is not the building where it takes place, but the people who are in it and our 'UP purpose' is to worship God with all of our heart, mind and soul.

Tracy then showed everyone "Rublev's Icon" which is 900 years old and depicts three people at a table. This has come to be seen as depicting the Trinity - God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. It is a devotional painting and, because of the relaxed nature of the figures, we can see they are in a relationship with each other and this is how we should worship God. Our 'IN purpose' is to be in a relationship with God and each other, in a community of love, unity, humility, harmony and peace. Our Church should be a community like this too, where we accept, encourage and love each other; that we are not a closed group, but open with room for anyone else to come in too.

Our 'OUT purpose' is that we have good news to share with others that God loves us and Jesus died for us and this news needs to be taken to our neighbours, friends, Diggle and the whole Saddleworth community and beyond. We know it can be hard to do this, but we need to take that message out and show that love for everyone.

We gave each other the stones with our names on. The prayers included a time of silence for us each to pray for the person named on the stone we now had. Afterwards we brought all the stones and placed them around the cross on the table, and Val reminded everyone that there were spaces on the table between the stones which left room for more people to join us.

A Patronal Civic Service of Welcome

Parish councils are the most local elected body within the English system of local government and are often referred to as the first tier of Local Government.

The origins of most English parishes date back over five hundred years to a time when England was divided into areas known as 'manors' owned by Lords. Taxation was levied by The Lord of the Manor to support the poor. Over time the Lord of the Manor's rights and responsibilities were taken over by the Church which had recognised rights and obligations of charity to the poor. The obligations were managed in each church's parochial area, known as a parish. These responsibilities were administered through meetings of the inhabitants and were known as Vestries (as they were usually held in the Church Vestry).

"Parish" is an old English word meaning a local territory or catchment area. In ancient times it played a very important role in the lives of people, from providing them with a sense of communal identity through to how they were governed. A parish had two principal functions:

- To act as a civil unit which was responsible for collecting taxes and tithes, the dispensing of justice and the raising of armies.
- An ecclesiastical institution served by a local church or chapel, with a priest or similar clergyman tending to the spiritual needs of local people.

Prior to Local Government re-organisation in the late 1800s, a parish was administered by the church, with the Overseers of the Poor and the Road Surveyors reporting to the Churchwardens. Before the days of local Rates or Council Taxes, the Church used to set a 'Tithe Apportionment' to pay for the poor.

By the late 19th Century, the two functions of civil and ecclesiastical parish were formally split in law. The Local Government Act (1894) created local authorities responsible for the administration of a parish's services as well as the civil functions of the older parochial institutions - the new authorities were known as Parish Councils.

Parishes and Parish Councils have been subject to many changes. One major one affecting Saddleworth was the Local Government Act (1974). Saddleworth Urban District Council was absorbed into Oldham Metropolitan Borough Council and the Saddleworth Parish Council was established. Few, if any, other Parishes seeking Neighbourhood Planning status have such a complex area of a large number of individual and diverse communities as Saddleworth. We are possibly the largest Parish council in the country covering a geographic area of 29.4 square miles (76 km²) and housing 25,500 people in over 12,000 households spread throughout 13 communities.




Saddleworth Parish Council is served by twenty elected councillors. Each year one is elected to chair the council. This year Rob Knotts, a member of the congregation of Holy Trinity Dobcross, has that honour. His inaugural church service will be held in

Holy Trinity Dobcross at 2:00pm on Trinity Sunday 27th May which will be attended by civic dignitaries from around the area, family and friends. Graham McGuffie has kindly agreed to be Rob's chaplain during his year of office. All are invited to attend and for refreshments at the Dobcross Band Club after the service.

It is a spiritual classic written by the retired Archbishop of Canterbury. It explores the transforming and challenging experience of silence and why it is something for which we should yearn.



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
