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# The Rector writes...

At the recent Royal Wedding of Prince Harry to Meghan Markel, the preacher, Archbishop Michael Curry spoke memorably in his sermon about the power of love.

The power of love is the power of God. It is power of a different order from power found in laws and treaties; in regulations and politics. It is not our familiar understanding of power exercised through status, success, money, control, manipulation, violence or abuse. It is the power of love to help and heal when nothing else can; to lift up and liberate when nothing else will. There is power in love to show us a different way to live. It is demonstrated in generosity, forgiveness, humility, apology and self-control.

Everything God has been trying to teach humanity since the time of Moses onwards is summed up in Jesus' commandment to love. For Jesus, love is not an easy choice or an optional extra. It is an intentional act of self-giving; of inconvenience, of taking risks and being vulnerable; it is a personal subsuming of our will to the will of God in the service of others. It is a daily surrender to the ways of God revealed in Jesus Christ. Love is the power of the Holy Spirit at work within us released through prayer.

Listening to God in prayer is an imperative. It informs our lives and judgements because silence is the language of God. In gazing upon God and being attentive to the moment, God's transforming work begins. It is then that we will have earned the right to speak and will have something to say to the world that is worth listening to, for the world is in desperate need of the power of love.

I have had the privilege of participating in major community events, including the mass pilgrimage up to Pots and Pans for Remembrance Sunday,

traditional brass music...and traditional Saddleworth weather!

My children have settled at school in Denshaw and have made many friends. My wife, Gemma, is already well-known in Dobcross as the keeper of an ever-growing menagerie of animals. The last time I checked, we had 2 dogs, a cat, a hamster,



2 fish, 2 stick insects, 12 sheep, 3 geese, 11 ducks and 10 chickens - who knows what's next?!

Also my 'brother-from-another-mother', Kile, is keen to settle in the area after moving from Manchester and finding work in dry stone walling through the Lancashire family.

All in all, as I spend time in Saddleworth - taking my children to school, shopping for last minute ingredients for dinner, or enjoying the occasional

coffee in Abaco - I feel more and more part of the community. I enjoy recognising familiar faces, and hope that people feel the same way when they bump into me on the street.

# The 2019 voyages of the slave ship Zong

# Highlighting yesterday's injustices and today's legacy



The movement for Justice and Reconciliation was born out of the desire to draw public attention to one of the great injustices of our age: the legacy of chattel slavery.

Britain transported millions of enslaved Africans to the New World, nearly 13% of whom died on the voyage.

The exploitation of these Africans, together with that of the new working classes at home, formed the human engine-room of Britain's Industrial Revolution, generating wealth and economic growth that laid the foundations of our modern society, but at a cost that has been largely hidden.

When slavery was abolished in the British Empire in 1833, £20 million was paid to British slave

owners: 40% of Government expenditure for 1834.



The equivalent to £17 billion today, this remained the largest Government pay-out ever made until the rescue of the banks in 2008.

#### Not a penny was paid to the slaves themselves.

This injustice left a legacy of underdevelopment and poverty in the Caribbean islands and has left its mark on Britain today. A number of banks, institutions and companies, still well known today, were founded and flourished due to enslavement.

After the last war Caribbeans, many of whom had served in the British forces, were encouraged to settle in Britain due to post-war labour shortages. Their labour was welcome but their presence was resented. "No Blacks" greeted them in many places. While such open racism is no longer tolerated, hidden attitudes, injustices and inequality still linger.

200 years of silence and historical amnesia on the facts and effects of slavery, both the suffering caused and the benefits it created for Britain, has

kept the wider British public in ignorance of what their forebears did in Africa and the Caribbean. In short: the legacy of slavery impacts us all.

The Zong Voyage aims to highlight these injustices and set in motion a wider project to effect community change.

Research has shown that colonial enslavement has left a deep-felt legacy of far reaching social and economic problems; a legacy that has yet to be sufficiently acknowledged or addressed.

In the summer of 2019 a replica slave ship will visit some of the British ports that were involved in the Trans-Atlantic slave trade.

The voyage is being planned in conjunction with local museums, churches and community groups, and will provide an opportunity to:

- experience something of life on board a slave ship
- visit the on-board exhibition about enslavement and its legacy down the generations
- attend a programme of related events

# The Chatty Café

A scheme to combat loneliness and isolation in Oldham has taken off less than three months after it launched. The Oldham Chronicle reported on new start-up project, The Chatty Café, in April 2017, which was set up to create a space for residents to talk and enjoy each other's company.



Lees-based mum-of-one Alexandra Hoskyn, who is the brains behind the idea, is excited to announce that 180 cafés across Britain have already adopted the scheme with more in the pipeline. She said: "There are a small number of cafés across Oldham that are involved and we are running a 'Get Oldham Chatting Week' during the last week in July to let people know more about the scheme and to publicise it. The idea is to encourage cafés to have a 'Chatter & Natter' table where customers can sit if they are happy to talk to other customers.

"It's fantastic that the scheme now has cafés in the Oldham borough with a 'Chatter & Natter' table."

Cafés in Grotton, Greenfield, Uppermill, Delph, Chadderton, Shaw and Oldham town centre have so far adopted the scheme.



The project is being supported by Oldham Council, Costa Coffee, Age UK and Spindles Shopping Centre.

# Iona of my heart - Iona of my love

The Island of Iona lies to the west of Mull. When the sun is shining, which is rather often here, the white sands and clean water make the sea a beautiful turquoise colour. The island itself is low lying and seems to float on the water. Iona is often described as a thin place, where heaven and earth seem very close together. Another way of putting this is that the spiritual and the earthly come close. As a very sacred place for many, it is certainly very special.

In 563 Columba and his twelve companions steered their currach, a vessel made of bent ash and covered in ox hides, onto the south coast of lona (St Columba's Bay). Having sailed from Ireland and first making landfall on Colonsay, they chose lona to settle and founded a monastic community. It became a thriving community and it is thought that this is where the Book of Kells was created. Columba died there in 597. The monastic community continued until the Scottish reformation with many pilgrims visiting the island abbey.

The present community was founded in 1938 by Revd George MacLeod to be a sign of the rebuilding of the common life of the church in the world and to break down the barriers between prayer and politics, between the religious and the ordinary. Their first task was the restoration of the ruined monastic buildings of the Abbey.

lona is 3 miles long by 1½ miles wide and has a population of around 120 permanent residents. The island welcomes up to 120,000 visitors each year to what is sometimes called the Cradle of Christianity in Scotland.

The Iona Community is a dispersed Christian ecumenical community working for peace and social justice, rebuilding of community and the renewal of worship. Members are men and women, lay and ordained, from different Christian traditions, living and working in many different countries.



Members renew their commitment to the community on a yearly basis and they are bound together by a rule of life and faith including prayer, engagement with scripture and public worship; meeting together; accountability on the use of time money and resources; and active working for justice and peace. The focus of the community's work lies in ecumenical activity, work with the poor and exploited, justice, peace and the integrity of creation, action in relation to racism and inter-faith concerns, work with young people, social and political change and the rediscovery of spirituality.

There is a small resident staff to welcome the many guests each year, to lead the worship and host volunteers and those on retreat or weeks of reflection, for whom there is residential accommodation in three centres on the island.

I have been visiting Iona, often with my family, for more than thirty years. Whether you go there to walk the islands, to wander over the beaches, to visit the Abbey and Abbey Church, you will find yourself stopping, looking about you and looking within you. Without traffic but with the constraints of weather and ferry timetable to get you on and off the island, you are, in a sense, enabled to be on retreat - away from it all, even if only for a few hours. Somehow, the place is spiritually refreshing.

> It is indeed a thin and sacred place, where the Light shines!

# A view behind bars – What about the Children?



The little boy stood poised on the edge of the visits hall, waiting for the officer to signal that he could come in. Then he charged between seats to his dad, who lifted him up and swung him around as he started to talk excitedly so as to get through what he wanted to say before his sister interrupted. It's a scene repeated in many a situation in everyday life. Except that this is prison.

That particular family meet almost every week. Rob is lucky enough that his wife seems to have forgiven him for bringing shame on the family and she books visits as often as she can and squeezes them around her work and the care for both children and an elderly relative.

Others are not treated in the same way. *'I'll give it* another year or so and then I'll talk to her' said one prisoner, when he'd told me that he rarely sees his daughter. I asked how old she is. *'Fourteen'*. And what does she know about the fact that her father is away from home? *'She thinks I work abroad. It* saves her having to feel embarrassed if anyone talks to her about her dad'. Personally, I question that approach but what would I know?

Meanwhile Dave, who doesn't write very well, thinks that he'd be better staying out of his small son's life and although he'd really like to write some letters, finds it too hard to put down on paper what he wants to say.

Recently I was asked to get in touch with the Salvation Army to ask for their help to trace someone's son. The adult son had not been in touch with his father for some years. *'Somewhere in Birmingham'* his dad thought.

What do the children think, when they're young and when they're grown, of this existence that their parent has shaped? Many of the men talk really fondly of their children and know their likes and dislikes and speak on the phone regularly. Some are more wistful. They've already lost touch. One told me how his boy has shocking behaviour because his partner can't handle him alone. Another talked about how the children expect bigger gifts because they don't see them often - as if material things could make up for the bond that's being stretched all the time. Yet another knows that his teenage boy has become wild and taken to drugs and is desperate to revive his relationship with him.

Ivan heard that his two-year-old daughter had been diagnosed with leukaemia. It was a shattering blow and his partner had to stop working to cope with the treatment regimes. Ivan was not able to visit, of course, and felt helpless. I'm glad to say that, unusually, he was allowed a video link phone call under supervision. Hardly the best contact for father and daughter but better than nothing.

Families are spoken of as high priority. So the visits hall is noisy with children on a regular basis, and the POPS (Partners of Prisoners and Family Support group) people arrange games and crafts for them. A two hour visit sitting in the same chair (prisoners aren't allowed to leave their seat) is too much to cope with for some and distractions are necessary.

Every now and again, prisoners can apply for a Family Day visit which allows them four hours and the smallest grains of normality as they queue up at the canteen to buy sandwiches or take the children to see the chickens, rabbits and guinea pigs outside.

My own memories of growing up include the times of children boasting in the classroom about what their mums and dads did. The reality may well have been different from the story. Did they really all become pilots, professional footballers and managing directors and star on TV shows? Unlikely! Yet I don't remember anyone boasting that their father was a criminal. Perhaps I did share a classroom with someone who knew that truth, I may never know. But I do, from time to time, try to imagine what the impact of the truth will be on young lives with such connections.

# **St Thomas Delph**

#### What's in a Name?

In one 'History of Heights' publication it states that in 1883 the decision was made to build a Mission church in the village of Delph. The publication then states that *"in 1941 services at the Parish church be on the first Sunday in each month from November to March and the other services to be held at St Hilda's Church."* Then fifty years ago Hilda lost her name and was renamed Thomas.

With the re-ordering, thinking through the past into the present and on into the future it has been suggested by some members of St Thomas Delph, that Hilda regain her stature in Delph and that what is now St Thomas' be renamed either:



St Thomas and St Hilda

or

St Thomas with St Hilda.



We are possibly all familiar with St Thomas the Apostle, Thomas (Hebrew or Aramaic for "twin") was also called "Didymus" (Greek for "twin"). He was absent when the Risen Lord appeared to the other apostles on the evening of Easter Day and refused to believe that Christ had indeed risen until he had seen him for himself. When he had seen Him, he said to Him,

#### "My Lord and My God." (John 20, v.19-29).

Because of this episode, he has been known ever since as "Doubting Thomas". But we ought also to remember his earlier words, when Jesus announced His intention of going to the Jerusalem area, brushing aside the protests of His disciples that His life was in danger there, at which Thomas said to the others:

#### "Let us also go, that we may die with him." (John 11, v.7,8,16)

If Thomas was pessimistic, he was also sturdily loyal. Tradition has it that Thomas travelled to Inia and took the Gospel from the North West to the South East of the country, along a line where today there are numerous churches named St Thomas. Although St Thomas's church has no pictures or identifying memorabilia/relics associated with St Thomas it does have a stained glass window of Hilda looking out across Whitby.

Bede describes Hilda as a woman of great energy, who was a skilled administrator and teacher. She gained such a reputation for wisdom that even kings and princes sought her advice, but she also had a concern for ordinary folk. Although Hilda must have had a strong character, she inspired affection. As Bede writes, *"All who knew her, called her mother, because of her outstanding devotion and grace".* 

Away from the legend, Hilda is cited for her part in the Synod of Whitby. The Synod of Whitby (664 A.D.) was a Northumbrian synod where King Oswiu of Northumbria ruled that his kingdom would calculate Easter and observe the monastic tonsure according to the customs of Rome, rather than the customs practised by Irish monks at Iona and its satellite institutions. The synod was summoned at Hilda's double monastery of Streonshalh (Streanæshalch), later called Whitby Abbey, of which she was the founder.

St Thomas's PCC will be discussing the matter in July.

#### Heights Church 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

On the weekend of 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> June 2018 the parish of St Thomas Friarmere celebrated the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the opening of a chapel at Heights. Three services took place to celebrate the anniversary.

Evensong was celebrated on Saturday at 4:00pm. In recognition that Denshaw parish was formed out of Friarmere and that many residents still have deep family connections with Heights, the service had a strong input and musical accompaniment from their congregation.

On Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> June at 10:30am, Eucharist led by The Right Revd Mark Davies, Bishop of Middleton, and was attended by about 100 people. His sermon made reference to the recently published book detailing the history of Heights and the planning involved in its inception. He highlighted how the Church is repeating past processes, such as church planting and church re-ordering, as it plans to take Mission and Ministry to the wider community. Whilst respecting the past but always looking to the future, the Bishop received Darren Quinlan into the Communion of the Church of England. The weekend closed at 4:00pm with a service of Songs of Praise. The older traditional hymns, chosen from Ancient & Modern, were accompanied by the church brass section. The well-attended service had members present from parishes across the Benefice. We were pleased that Revd Nick Feist and his wife Mary were present. Nick was Vicar at St Thomas's from 1980 to 1988.



On both afternoons the Church was open. As well as locals, visitors arrived from far afield as Leicester including a visit from Revd Sidney Orme's daughter and granddaughter. He was the vicar who oversaw the closure of Heights and the transformation of the then St Hilda's church into the parish church of St. Thomas.

There were excellent displays of work by The Piecemakers. Two exceptional items were a new quilted wall-hanging made to celebrate the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and the quilted wall-hanging commissioned by the Denshaw Hall, completed in 2009. The latter was hung over the balcony at the West end of the church suspended from the organ loft for full viewing. Whilst the current



Whit Friday Banner is displayed in the parish church in the village, the original banner which is over 90 years old and the intermediate banner were also on display at Heights.



The book, "Heights Church and Friarmere - A Potted History 1758 - 2018" was on sale for £15 with the authors, Mary Rodgers and Geoffrey Dent, present for book signing and discussion of the contents. These include a History of Heights until the closure, St Hilda's conversion to St Thomas' to the present, a history of Whit Friday and other notable events. There are pictures of all the stained glass windows in both Heights and the former St Hilda's.

#### **Our Charities**

Each year at AGM we vote to support a charity for the coming year and we like to alternate between a local charity and an international one. Having successfully raised funds for Reuben's Retreat throughout 2017/18, in April, Christ Church Friezland voted to support TWO international charities:

Saddleworth Palestine Women's Scholarship Fund raises money to help women in Palestine, specifically those living in the Gaza Strip, access higher education.

They work closely with Sheffield Palestine Women's Scholarship Fund who manage the Fund in the UK. Groups in Sheffield, Saddleworth and Bolton are currently supporting nearly 40 women through higher education. In Gaza the Fund is managed by a panel drawn from the Board of Directors of the Red Crescent Society and the Union of Health Work Committees.

Candidates for scholarships are nominated by their local community centre and are either ready to enter university or are in the first or second year of a course but unable to continue for financial reasons. There are strict selection criteria for the Scholarship Fund, which include:

- + having attained 65% or above in high school grades;
- † socio-economic background;
- + commitment to the community;
- † and personal and family circumstances such as a recent home demolition, or war injuries.

Partners in Gaza keep in contact with the scholarship students and help them overcome problems in completing their courses, from bombings to not being able to afford transport, books, equipment etc. Partners access other small amounts of funding to cover some of these additional costs. In Britain the Fund's supporters make donations or monthly contributions through standing order or by organising or taking part in fundraising events.

On 9<sup>th</sup> June St Mary's held a coffee morning as part of our efforts to raise funds for Christian Aid. We were grateful that those at the



Methodist Church welcomed us to use their hall and facilities. The event was well-supported by members of both churches and other people from the village. The coffee morning raised £291.12 towards our overall total donation of £471.32 for Christian Aid week.

Sharing our faith and supporting one another was also evident at the Ascension Day service for our Benefice which was held at St Mary's on 10<sup>th</sup> May. In recent years this service has been held at St Mary's church as it was dedicated on Ascension Day in 1875. Still on the theme of sharing our faith and supporting one another, we have a date for your diary of another event at St Mary's church to which everyone will be invited.

On Friday 14<sup>th</sup> December, we are pleased that The Right Reverend Mark Davies, Bishop of Middleton, will lead our worship and formally open our third

Christmas Tree Festival. Pat Bottom is already busy going around the village asking local businesses, shops and organisations to sponsor and decorate trees. We are also pleased that both schools, St Mary's and Greenfield Primary,



will be decorating trees. We have invited them to take part in the service or provide some of the entertainment during the evenings that the church will be open. More information and publicity will be provided nearer the time.

The church has previously held Christmas Tree festivals in 2013 and 2015, both of these were real community events, so we are hoping for the same this time. The display of beautifully decorated trees and their wonderful scent, the lights, the atmosphere, and the happy smiles of those who attend all make this a very joyful occasion.



Speaking of joy, all our churches will also know something of the joys of the Faculty application process! As I write, St Mary's church has submitted an application for a faculty for guards to protect the stained glass windows, one of which has been broken in two places within the last two years. In the near future, we will also be applying for a faculty to repair the organ and restore it to its original state. The PCC has agreed that the work will be done in two phases, initially to repair the bellows, so that the organ can be played again,



followed by more major work at a later stage, to undertake a complete restoration. Currently, we are awaiting further advice from the Diocese regarding this particular faculty application, and we're also looking into

applying for grants for the cost of the work, although the Organ Trust group has already raised a significant amount through events and donations.

With such an emphasis on jobs that need to be done to preserve and care for our much-loved buildings and their contents, and therefore on money and the financial status of our churches, it is easy to lose sight of more spiritual things. However, I am pleased to report that Alison O'Brien, who has attended St Mary's church since she was a child, is coming to the end of her training as an Authorised Lay Minister (ALM) and will be commissioned on 23<sup>rd</sup> September. Alison has studied on the worship elective and has already taken part in leading services at St Mary's church. We all wish her well, and pray for God's blessings upon her and her future ministry.

The commitment of so many people who work for and support our churches, such as ALMs and Ordained Local Ministers (OLMs) and others from across our benefice, reminds me of all that we learn from one another, and the continuity of our faith throughout the generations.

This brings me to St Mary's Book of Remembrance, and the names that are included in there for August and September. 

# The Calling

It makes you think, you know. I'll be sixty-eight this month and you start to wonder how much time you've got left and what you need to pack into it. I can't say I was ever attracted to the pipe and slippers type of retirement, but I hadn't expected at this late stage to be called to be a priest in the Church of England. However, when the call came it was quite unmistakable. I'll tell you about it sometime.

The church has a very robust filtering process, and in my innocence, I thought that in view of my age there would be a short cut for me. It hasn't been so, and, although I've been impatient to move on at some times, generally I've been glad of the slow process. It changes things, it changes everything, and I've needed time to absorb the change.

The discerning process starts first of all within the diocese. The director of ordinands guides you through the process, sending you to be quizzed by a variety of wise people. When you're ready you're sent to a selection conference known as Bishops' Advisory Panel. This is a three-day meeting of potential candidates for ordination from all over England and I found it demanding but stimulating. Candidates are scrutinised and given various

exercises to do. It's a holy version of tough mudder. Later, you find out whether you've been recommended for training.

I started training this time last year with All Saints, a theological training institution based at Chester University. The training is a mixture of weekday training in the evenings, weekend schools, a summer school and a retreat. I've done a year now and finally I'm feeling that I've found my feet. As a retired person, I've got much more control of my personal timetable. Some people are managing to train as well as doing a full-time job and bring up a young family. The problem for me has been in adjusting to changes in education. It's more than thirty years since I did any formal academic work and things have changed. We've had assignments to do on Preaching, the Old Testament, and Worship, as well as courses on Funerals and Baptisms.

So now I'm moving into my second year and this time next year, if the bishop approves, I'll be ordained deacon. It feels a joy and a privilege to be chosen by God to follow this new and exciting pathway in the last portion of my life.

# Thank you for your continued support





Oldham Mountain Rescue Team started in 1964 as Oldham Rover Mountain Rescue Team from their Glodwick Rover Scout base with a few ropes and a stretcher and with no funds, no base and no vehicles. Volunteers supplied all their own clothing and climbing equipment and used their own cars. They attended the Clarence Hotel in Greenfield waiting for any calls that might come through to the GPO telephone kiosk at the pub. Training consisted of group self-improvement, reading how to do it and practising where they could.

New members were recruited from local climbers and each subscribed £5 per annum. An old ambulance was bought for £25 from the ambulance service until it failed and was replaced by a dreadful Austin Champ - fun, but lethal! Then came a series of cheap Land Rovers - creaking wrecks - obtained with the generosity of Norweb, BT and others.

The Team had taken to meeting at the Cross Keys Inn and was offered long-term use of the barn by John Willie Lees as a headquarters; somewhere to hold meetings and garage our vehicle. For many years, the sole source of income was a grant of £600 annually from Oldham Council. In addition, team members had to fundraise to cover the cost of the vehicle, the electricity bill, and to start purchasing better equipment as rescue standards improved. A national Mountain Rescue pager contract with Vodafone was started as an Oldham Mountain Rescue Team initiative - a massive improvement in Team callout speed, but yet another cost. By the time the Team had managed to acquire a second Land Rover we were assisting the ambulance service especially in winter. The winter of 2009/10 caused a massive workload on the Team which was witnessed by several generous organisations resulting in some astounding grant funding as well as public contributions, just as we were about to start a fundraising year for two new vehicles. Such was financial support from local people, local walking groups, businesses, schools and organisations too numerous to mention that we were in a position to purchase a third vehicle, a mobile control centre from a neighbouring Team and Greater Manchester Police finally came up with a mini-bus surplus to their requirements.

Such was the growth of the Team that we needed to consider larger premises for garaging and we thought long and hard before renting space at Boarshurst Business Park to house the vehicles and the burgeoning level of equipment. We have recently moved to even larger premises at Boarshurst and held an Open Day on 3<sup>rd</sup> June 2018 to say thank you to all the countless people who have helped us. We were delighted with the attendance of the public and the massive support shown by the Fire, Police and Ambulance Services.



Our running costs have risen in 55 years from about £250 per annum to around £35,000. Modern life requires insurance, communications, repairs and replacements, fuel bills and rent - most of which weren't needed in the "old days". We are so grateful that local people recognise the work we do and support us to that level.

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
