

Saint Oscar Romero (1917 - 1980)

On 23rd February 1977 Oscar Romero was appointed Archbishop of El Salvador. His appointment was met with surprise, dismay, and even incredulity. Whilst welcomed by the government, many priests were disappointed that his conservative reputation would negatively affect liberation theology's commitment to the poor.

On 12th March 1977 a progressive Jesuit priest and personal friend of Romero called Rutilio Grande was assassinated. His death had a profound impact on Romero. He urged the government to investigate but they ignored his request, and the censored press remained silent. From this time onwards, Archbishop Oscar Romero revealed a radicalism that had not been evident earlier. Traditionally the Church had been seen as complicit in the aims of the state and military to privilege the wealthy and powerful, while the majority of the population lived in abject poverty. He spoke out against poverty, social injustice, assassinations and torture. Oscar Romero's love for his people who were suffering violence and oppression led him to take their side and to denounce their oppressors. He was killed, whilst saying Mass, on 24th March 1980.





Romero's lifelong quest for God gained a new depth when he discovered God in the reality of the poor. Struggling against sin was not just a personal endeavour but a call to fight against the ways that other people were being deprived of their God-given dignity. Romero recognised that ignorance and privilege can blind people to the ways that sin dominates our world. He calls people to the reality of the poor and marginalised and confronts us with the daily demand for conversion – a conversion that 'turns away' from that sin and 'turns towards' full communion with our neighbours and God.

Followers of Christ must live and proclaim an authentic good news to those who are poor and marginalised. Their spirituality must be one that unites the love of God and neighbour, and sees the face of Christ in the many who are crucified. Oscar Romero, murdered for his courageous defence of human rights, offers inspiration for this great challenge by giving new meaning to conversion, discipleship and martyrdom.

A future not our own

It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view.

The kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision.

We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is another way of saying that the Kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith. No confession brings perfection. No pastoral visit brings wholeness. No programme accomplishes the Church's mission.

No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

That is what we are about.

We plant a seed
that will one day grow.

We water seeds already planted,
knowing that they hold future promise.

We lay foundations that will need
further development.

We provide yeast that produces effects
far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realising that.

This enables us to do something, and to do it very well.

It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.

We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders, ministers, not messiahs.

We are prophets of a future not our own.

This prayer was composed by Bishop Ken Untener of Saginaw. It was drafted for a homily by Cardinal John Dearden in November 1979 for a celebration of departed priests. As a reflection on the anniversary of the martyrdom of Bishop Romero, Bishop Untener included in a reflection book a passage titled "The mystery of the Romero Prayer". The mystery is that the words of the prayer are attributed to Oscar Romero, but they were never spoken by him.

"For you it might be a time of joy and togetherness. Or perhaps it's all about planning and to-do lists. Many others can find it a sad and lonely time – nagged by the feeling that your Christmas is not like those 'perfect' ones we see in the media.

"But just like the unexpected assortment of people who were invited to meet the baby Jesus, #FollowTheStar doesn't ask you to be perfect.

"It says: come just as you are to take the life-changing Christmas journey."

There is a booklet '#FollowTheStar: A journey through the 12 days of Christmas', which invites everyone to travel in the footsteps of the Wise Men to meet Jesus. It offers fourteen daily reflections – beginning on Christmas Eve and finishing on the Epiphany (6 January).



A view behind bars - Healing Touch



On Sunday afternoon I shook the clammy hand of someone who is far from handsome; another hand of a man who, to be honest, nearly always smells because his personal hygiene is poor. I shook the hand of a murderer and another hand that had probably held a handmade cigarette laced with drugs at some point last week. We shared "The Peace of Christ" during our Communion service and I thought about the simple yet profound business of touch.

It's true that had I been in a social setting with some of these men I may have avoided the handshakes, but I found myself drawn back to the story of Jesus and a man with leprosy who's disease meant a life of isolation. He was considered fit to be near nobody except for others who shared the same kinds of deformities. As far as polite society was concerned, especially within the religious settings, such people were considered dirty. If they did venture outside their own commune, they should announce their presence from a long way off so that others could avoid them.

Yet the man who came to Jesus dared to come nearer:

"Master, if you are willing, you can make me clean" he says, kneeling at Jesus' feet. (Mark 1, v.40)

Not only does Jesus miraculously reward such courageous trust with healing, he reaches out his hand to touch the man. As well as cleansing, Jesus

gave a loving touch to the man despite his outward appearance. And perhaps that counted as much as being made well, for in that touch someone showed that he was worth loving.

Touch is challenging! Some of us would rather preserve our own 'personal space' for any number of reasons. Some of us are repelled by others by the way they look or the way they live. It is a challenge to our church congregations when, so often populated by carefully dressed and well-behaved individuals, we find visitors who may not observe the same codes as us.

I wonder what kind of touch those men in prison have received or given in their lives? I know that some have known or dispensed aggression, violence and abuse. Perhaps a handshake represents a step in the right direction that offers renewal and a better way to be.

Two days after our Communion service, I sat by the bedside of a man curled up in pain and emotion in a hospice. As his eyes closed, a single tear slipped down his cheek. He made no effort to wipe it away, so I dared to do it for him. Our conversation had been difficult for him, both for his physical symptoms and its content, driven by news he had earlier received. His fight and hope were gone.

A few minutes later he tottered off the bed and across the room on his skin-and-bone frame hidden by a jumper and a baggy pair of trousers. As he wept, to my surprise, he stretched his arms out and fell on me with a hug.

I can say little more about his situation. I only know that he needed, at that moment, to know he could touch me and I would not push him away.


Where did you read yours?

In 1968 a booklet was compiled to celebrate the 200th Anniversary of the opening of Heights Chapel. The booklet had twenty pages and cost 3 shillings (15p!). In 2016 a small group gathered to discuss how to celebrate the 250th Anniversary and from that the idea of a revised booklet emerged.

Fortunately, John Battye, Mary Broadbent and the late Joan Senior who had all contributed to the original were still around and interested in an updated publication. All three had extensive knowledge and access to information about the church and village. Geoffrey Dent offered to help Mary draw the material together to expand and add to the original booklet. Very quickly they realised that it was becoming a case of what couldn't be fitted in rather than would there be enough to be interesting. Over twenty people made significant contributions with several others supplying vital information. Many people came forward with recollections from family and personal experience. The booklet became a book of seven chapters.

Many changes happened to St Thomas' church over the years and are still ongoing. The book tried to record these in the context of life in the surrounding communities which caused some of those changes. There were dramatic events such as the church walk-out recorded in the national

press and more humorous ones as described by John Battye in his early life in Delph. Mary has several family items of correspondence from Ammon Wrigley. These provided the Cover picture and the previously unpublished dialect poem.



We expected that people currently attending church and longer established in the village would be the main customers. However we have been amazed at the depth of interest from families with connections at Heights, widespread throughout the country and now internationally. A number of people, including a former vicar's daughter, have commented on how the book has brought back happy childhood memories of life in Delph and the Whit Friday miracle in particular. We expected sales in the wider Oldham area but have sent

copies to a book shop in Suffolk, a lady in Penzance and recently to a lady in Australia. We are also aware of a book being passed through a family to a relative in New Zealand, hence the question "Where did you read yours?" Revd John Rosedale took his to Wales as holiday reading.



Several people have now given us more information on the church and their family history including those who went to the US and made their fortune. We need to decide how to present this. A second book....? We have also had a number of questions from people about family members in the graveyard. Fortunately Derek Seddon, the current grave digger, has compiled a complete list of burials and grave numbers. His map is printed in the book. A number of people have told us that having read the book they bought another for family members and friends as a present.

If you are still looking for that vital Christmas present the book is available from Delph Post Office, Delph Library, Uppermill Museum, the Team office and the authors for £15. Re-ordering Update

We have had teams getting together midweek and at weekends to undertake some of the work ahead of the tendering process. The teams are now awaiting the go ahead to remove the raised chancel. The organ has been removed by a team

builder. In doing so,
an unknown window
was discovered. The
tendering process
has been delayed by



at least two months. The problems with the sycamore tree and providing disabled access have now have been resolved. The main entrance with disabled access will be in the middle of the South side of the building, similar to many cathedrals.

St Thomas' church is now looking for grants; one has already been approved. Those with a gift for fund raising have been asked to put their skills to good use. Watch this space to see the progress.

An update to "What's in a name?"

After St Thomas' congregation offered their thoughts on changing the name of the church there was no clear conclusion for the PCC to work with. The PCC decided to discuss the matter further. As the planning permission for alterations and improvements to the building has taken longer than expected, no immediate decision is required. However, the responses indicated that for a significant number of the congregation the reinstatement of Hilda is important and discussions are taking place as to how that can be managed through means other than renaming the church.

Messy Church

Messy Church is held regularly in the church and school room. The last Messy



Church was held in September. We have an average attendance of eighty to one hundred people together with around twenty five helpers.

Families come from all over Saddleworth as it is advertised through local schools. This time, we think that some may have been families from other villages who came because they had missed their usual church because of the Saddleworth Olympics

Abby Brunton is the main organiser of Messy Church, but there are a many other helpers.

What is Messy Church?

- † Messy Church is a way of being a church for families:
- † It is found across the world, therefore international;
- † It involves having fun and fellowship;
- † Its values are about being Christ-centred for all ages based on creativity, hospitality and celebration.

How do we do Messy Church?

- † It happens about five times a year;
- † Once the Bible theme is decided various activities are planned with the theme in mind.
- † At 4:00pm people begin to arrive and are provided with identity "stickers", a programme of the day's events, and a carrier-bag in which to take home all the "goodies".



- † It is a joy to meet our regular "clientele" and see the pleasure with which the children are quickly involved in the various activities.

 better.



Not only did they repair our walls, they gave demonstrations of their craft to those brave folk who showed up and gave instruction to those from the church who got stuck in and assisted in the



re-building of the historic walls. Our heart-felt thanks go to Paul Clayton and his fellow artisans for their work and generosity.

Those coming in from the cold found the church warm and welcoming with home-made cake and hot drinks, while those interested in church history looked round at the memorabilia specially set out for Heritage weekend.

The day also provided an opportunity to celebrate our work as an award-winning *Eco-Church* - the certificate for our Bronze Award was waiting for us in the mail-box when we arrived and a plaque for display is to follow. We



were able to talk to visitors about our endeavours to reduce our carbon footprint and to make the most of our beautiful grounds, in terms of sustaining an ecologically friendly environment and a space to be enjoyed by the wider community. During the day, many "bug hotels", made by our children in Sunday School, were placed within the church grounds in readiness for invertebrates to hibernate during the winter.

Thank you to everyone who made the day so special and to all who visited the church and its grounds. We hope to see you all again.

We now have both the plaque and certificate and join our namesake parish at Friezland in achieving Bronze Status. Needless to say members are now working hard towards the silver award – watch this space.

Remembrance Sunday

Our Service of Songs of Praise which celebrated 100 years since the end of WW1, gave a special meaning to our Remembrance Day service as we were able to find out something about each soldier from the village who died. Their CVs were read out at the service and candles were lit in memory of each of those who gave their lives. As always, the names of the fallen of both wars were read out and at 11:00am the Last Post and Reveille were sounded by a member of our congregation, Claire Chalk. We hoped the names from WW1 carried a little more meaning now we know more about them. Next year WW2 soldiers perhaps? Following the service, the wreaths laid in church were taken to the Denshaw War Memorial in our churchyard.

During the week preceding Remembrance Sunday, we used the information gathered for the Songs of Praise service and posted details of the individual soldiers who died in WW1 and whose names appear on the War Memorial, at appropriate spots around the village along with a poppy for remembrance. Each tribute was placed as near to their known family home or near to those whose descendants we remember living in Denshaw. The remainder were placed on the green, where there is a metal profile of a WW1 soldier, produced and erected by the Oddfellows Club. In addition, these CVs and some photographs of the young soldiers were displayed inside the church lych-gate. Fittingly, the gate is adjacent to the memorial which was consecrated by Revd Thomas Storey-Bates (vicar of St. Thomas' Friarmere), and unveiled by Captain Joel Buckley MC 98 years ago. We are extremely grateful to Mike Buckley for allowing us to use information researched over the years for Christ Church Denshaw that enabled us to carry out this project.

Looking Forward Black Dyke Concert

Everyone at Denshaw (and beyond) is looking forward to another wonderful evening with the world famous Black Dyke Band under the direction of Professor Nicholas Childs. When Nick and Alison made their home in the village about ten years ago they immediately became an integral part of the community. It was Nick's idea to 'give something back' by arranging for Black Dyke to give a concert

in Denshaw. He specified that this should be held in church and funds raised should go to church. With church as the venue it is a wonderful opportunity for those new to the village to step



inside the building and feel the genuine warmth extended to all visitors.

This will be the fifth concert Nick and his family have organised for the church. Alison is a wonderful organiser and tells us that both she and Nick really enjoy organising a concert in their own village. They are certainly very much appreciated. The family are so efficient that it leaves our PCC with little to do apart from moving the choir stalls to accommodate the band and having them back in place ready for Sunday morning service. The concert takes place on **Saturday evening**, 1st **December**.



The monthly magazine dealt with matters of present interest, early history of the Church and Parish and said something of the Churchmen who in the early days were the pillar of the Church in Dobcross.

"Dobcross Church for the Dobcross" people." -Revd. Thomas' mission statement for the first edition of a Parish Magazine, (formerly the Newsletter and now The Grapevine), has continued unbroken for a hundred years.


Love bears all things, believes all things, endures all things.



My Visit to GOSH


During my year as Rose Queen at St Anne's Church the money my retinue and I raised, from our events, was split between church and Great Ormond Street Hospital charity (GOSH).

Traidcraft's Future

Those of us who run Traidcraft stalls received a letter in September giving us the awful news that Traidcraft PLC is having to stop trading at the end of this year. There is talk of relaunching a scaled down version of the PLC.

In October the charity arm, Traidcraft Exchange, wrote that they will continue. Part of their income came from Traidcraft PLC so they are now appealing to us to make direct contributions.

Their immediate mission is three fold:

- † to use expertise in trade to support those Traidcraft PLC **producers** worst affected by the demise of the PLC;
- to secure enough support and funds to continue their work in helping over 300,000 poor people get a better deal through trade, fair trade;
- to continue to fight for a world where all trade is fair



Some of the activities have included making collage pumpkins, painting autumn trees, reading Harvest poetry and even playing Beetle Drive!

The school values the relationships that we establish within the community and continues to recognize the social benefits for all involved. We very much look forward to planning activities for the season of Advent.



Salvadoran visitors to Saddleworth

Members of the local charity 'Wellsprings El Tular' were delighted to welcome four visitors from El Salvador for a 12-day stay in Saddleworth early in October. The charity has a unique 'friendship and development' connection with the poor subsistence farming community known as 'El Tular' in the southwest of El Salvador, Central America.

The area relies primarily on the production of maize, which is increasingly succumbing to the effects of drought and climate change. Through many visits and delegations, the link has become crucial in their commitment to bring together a deepening of faith and friendship together with the quest for a more just and caring world.



Over more than 20 years Wellsprings El Tular has helped around 150 young people by providing funding to help further their education and hence reduce their reliance on the maize crop. A microcredit fund has supported villagers starting new business enterprises and also with assistance for those requiring special medical care.

Private donations funded the visit to Saddleworth by Allan, from the charity 'Balsamo', along with Victor, Maria, and Carlos from El Tular. 'Balsamo' is based in San Salvador and acts partly as an intermediary between Wellsprings in the UK and El Tular. Carlos, aged 22, said,

"I am very grateful to Wellsprings in the UK for what they have done for me. I have been able to study electrical engineering and now have a job."

Their busy programme included attending assembly at St Chad's Primary School and visiting Saddleworth School where they were able to speak



to students studying Spanish. Stories of life in El Tular were shared during several church services. Trips included: a day in York, which for some was their first ever train journey, watching Rochdale AFC in action at the Spotland stadium, and various sight-seeing trips around Oldham and Manchester. They enjoyed their visit to Saddleworth Museum and were treated to some northern culture with the Houghton Weavers and Delph Band in concert.

A highlight of the visit was an opportunity to take part in a special ecumenical service of thanksgiving in the Church of Sacred Heart & St William to mark the canonization of Oscar Romero by Pope Francis on Sunday 14th October. As Archbishop of San Salvador, Oscar Romero spoke out against poverty, social injustice, and torture. In 1980 he was assassinated whilst offering mass. He is El Salvador's first saint. Father Bernard Bickers said, "...having Maria, Alan, Carlos and Victor with us at the service made it very special and a number of our own parishioners said how moved they had been by what they had to say."

The Diggle Village Harvest Service took place as usual at the allotments on Ward Lane on a dry, but unusually chilly, Sunday morning. Ably encouraged by Diggle Band the service began with a rendition of 'We plough the fields and scatter'.

This was followed by a dramatic presentation of Luke 8, v.4-15 performed by Hilary and Val with support from a cast of Sunday School children, who took on the roles of sower, corn, thorns, birds, etc. with much enthusiasm. The Bible reading looked at how corn, planted in the right conditions can grow tall and strong.

We then looked at a different kind of crop. Although potatoes can, on the surface at least, look like a pretty rubbish crop by the time they are harvested, there can be lots going on under the surface that is good. The local cubs helped Jon to dig up our potato plant and (thankfully!) a bumper crop of potatoes was revealed. It just shows that



outward appearances can be misleading, there can be a lot of good things going on inside that we are not always aware of. A bit like people really!

The Brownies then took over to celebrate the different uses for potatoes. They explained that just as there are many different ways a potato can be prepared and eaten, they themselves are all different. Each of them is working towards different



Brownie badges to demonstrate their skills and interests. God loves us because of our differences and no one person is better than another.

Finally, with the assistance of the Rainbows we looked at what Mr Potato Head might see if he came to Church. Together we reflected that:

- † with his eyes he would see lots of happy smiling faces as we say thank you to God for our community here in Diggle;
- † his ears would help Mr Potato Head to listen in Church as God's message is explored,

- † with his mouth he would be able to sing, pray and praise God, telling everyone about Church and what they might find if they came along;
- † with his hands he would be able to shake hands with his new friends, and join them in prayer.
- † and his nose is in the centre of his face. Jesus should always be at the centre of everything we do; we should worship him and follow in his footsteps.

Thanks to the Rainbows, Brownies, Cubs and Sunday School members, as well as to the Allotment Society for providing such a stunning setting and Diggle Band for keeping us on track with all of the hymns. Special thanks to Hilary, who didn't know



what to expect at our service, but was happy to join in, and to the Diggle Community for turning out and for providing such generous donations (collected in our very own wheelbarrow, for the Booth Centre and Oldham Foodbank).

We have also purchased a selection of cards and stamps on behalf of our clients making this easier for them. We caringly handwrite them and post them out.




