The Environment and Ecology

On Wednesday 12th February the General Synod set a 2030 target for net zero carbon emissions by the Church of England. It recognised that global climate emergency is a crisis for God's creation

Launching the Lent resources, The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, said:

"We urgently need to rebuild our relationship with our planet. To do this, we need to change our habits in how we pray and how we act."

Ruth Valerio, the author of his Lent book, '*Saying Yes to Life*' said:

"Responding to the poverty and environmental crises of our times goes right to the heart of what it means to be a Christian in today's world, following God who calls us to act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with him." Professor Kevin Anderson at Manchester University's Tyndall Centre says (I paraphrase):

"We are the pinnacle of 3.5 billion years of evolution. We have capacity for beauty and for destroying.

"Do we posses the qualities needed to harmonise survival or shall the human race become an anomaly in the fossil record?

"To avert disaster we must achieve zero carbon emissions by the mid 2030s at the latest."

The Centre for Alternative Technology in the Zero Carbon Britain Report states:

"We have already got the tools and technology to efficiently power the UK with 100% renewable energy, to feed ourselves sustainably, and leave a safe and habitable climate for future generations.

Discipleship Groups

The story of the Good Samaritan:

Jesus told the story and then asked a question: "Which of the people was a neighbour to the man who fell among thieves?"

The answer from one in the audience was: "The one who showed mercy."

Jesus replied:

'Go and do likewise' (Luke 10 v.25-37)

In a way, that is what all of us are called to do when we hear or read the Bible:

to ask questions which lead to a response.

Discipleship is about relating:

- + what we see in the Bible,
- † hear from Christian friends,
- † or follow in our church traditions,

to the everyday business of living where we are.

Our **Discipleship Groups** have made a start. After a launch service in Kilngreen where people readily talked about what the Bible passages for the day meant to them, a small group of people agreed to form our first **Discipleship Group**.

They are going to join up for a drink in the pub and use five questions to help each other think about a reading from the Gospels that will be used in some churches on the following week; the preachers will need to be on their toes! Since then, another group has been formed by friends who already meet in each other's homes to share in Holy Communion.

Two other churches are talking about how they might begin groups in ways that fit with the people who attend.

It is not about being led from the front by someone who expects you to have all the answers. It is about talking with each other about the insights you have.

A set of five basic questions are asked each time you meet to stop you going off track too much!

- What does this passage say to you about God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit?
- What does this passage say to you about people?
- What does the passage say to me in my own situation?
- † Is there something here we need to do?
- Is there someone else I could tell about what I've learned?

The Venerable David Sharples (of Rochdale)

In November 2019, Bishop David announced the following changes to the archdeaconry arrangements in the diocese:

In due course, the Venerable David Sharples will become the new Archdeacon of Rochdale, whilst remaining a residentiary canon of the Cathedral.

The Venerable Jean Burgess has agreed to become Archdeacon of Salford in addition to being Archdeacon of Bolton.

The Archdeaconry of Manchester will not be directly affected by these changes, although the Venerable Karen Lund will consider, in conjunction with her archdeacon colleagues, how their diocesan-wide responsibilities may best be redistributed between them.

Forty-six years ago I woke up one morning to discover that I lived in Rochdale. The thing is I hadn't moved but Her Majesty's Government had re-drawn the map. In 1974 the Rochdale Metropolitan Borough was created after the implementation of the Local Government Act and, as I was born on Langley Estate near Middleton, I now found myself in this new authority.

Boundaries are odd things. Herman Hesse the German novelist once wrote how in our everyday lives boundaries are just lines on maps that we usually ignore until there is conflict and then they become all-important. And as I'm writing for a Saddleworth publication I won't even mention Lancashire and Yorkshire... suffice it to say that I'm fairly local.



I studied Theology at King's College London and prepared for priesthood at the College of the Resurrection Mirfield.

I served my curacy in Prestwich before becoming the Vicar of St Anne's Royton where I stayed for 15 years until I was appointed Diocesan Director of Ordinands (DDO) and I'm happy to say that in that role I shared in the vocational journey of some of the clergy currently serving in the Saddleworth benefice.

Ten years ago I become Archdeacon of Salford alongside my role as DDO and then my role was re-configured as archdeacon and residentiary Canon at Manchester Cathedral. I'm sure that like so many of you, I rejoiced when I heard the news that Cherry Vann had been elected as Bishop of Monmouth but only later did it dawn on me that this might have implications for me and my archdeacon colleagues.



And so I find myself on the threshold of becoming the Archdeacon of Rochdale. It does feel like coming home; many of my immediate family live in this archdeaconry and my time as parish priest in Royton were the most formative years of my life. That experience was immeasurably enriched by serving as chaplain at Dr Kershaw's Hospice.

I'm married to Elaine, proud dad to Jonathan and Nicholas (who's married to Isabelle) and a besotted grandfather to Maxwell and Leon. Those who know me are well aware of my football allegiance and I still manage to get to most home matches and I also enjoy theatre, reading, walking, eating.

I won't be officially licensed as Archdeacon of Rochdale until 26th April but I have already begun to work with parishes across the archdeaconry, ably assisted by Canon Karen Smeeton. I am excited by this new challenge and look forward to working with you. The challenges we face are daunting but we serve a great and gracious God, so please pray for me as I will pray for you.

A view behind bars - Moving On



We like to think that all the men we see in prison are respected and valued by the Chaplaincy Team but we become especially attached to those who come to the Sunday services or study groups, having found direction, as Christ-believing men.

In the last few weeks no less than five of these have moved on to other places and their experiences will have been as varied as their own personalities. They show a microcosm of the prison and probation system, its successes and failings.

Nigel called our prison 'holiday camp', maintaining that it wasn't difficult to do a sentence. He did work hard at the courses required by his sentence plan. When his release was due, he was outraged that he was required to travel three days a week for seven weeks to the city to complete a further course which could not be offered at our prison.

There are a number of courses, in particular those connected with violence reduction, which are intensive for staff and it seems that many lower category prisoners are asked either to go to higher category prisons to do the work or to complete a course after release. News reached us that, having refused to do the travelling at his expense, he had been taken back into custody to finish the work.


In quick succession two more of our men finally 'got their D cat.' To move from our prison to D Category prisons means they will still spend some months on 'lie down' to assess their behaviour. Once that is complete, jobs outside the prison walls, day visits to family and occasional weekend visits are possible.

Equally available, of course, are the temptations to abscond, waste their time and revert to previous behaviours that caused difficulties in the first place. Not everyone can take it. We hope our boys can.

Then there is Alan. An older man who feels that his family have no expectations of him being able to change. His second prison sentence has been a hard shock for him to bear, especially as he recently heard of his father's terminal illness. He faces the outside world with determination to hold onto God and his feet seem to be firmly on the ground. Yet for all his banter, wit and cheeriness whilst he has been working as our chapel orderly, there were moments in our one-to-one Bible studies when his eyes filled with tears and he admitted his fear.

Of all those recently moved on, perhaps the most vulnerable was Ian. With a fragile faith he seems the one most likely to be drawn back into difficult and harmful ways of life. We had hoped he would have a place at a local Christian home for ex offenders, who work together to create a family environment, and an inspirational community for others. They have visited us and spoken at our services many times. It was late that the possibility arrived and it seemed that the authorities could not get an interview set up quickly enough.

So, a little while ago, lan walked out of prison a free man with £46.00 in his pocket, a travel warrant part way up the country, and no credit on his phone. Ahead of him was a journey to a former partner without knowing whether he would have a place to stay when he got there or not. We asked him to contact one or other of two chaplains as soon as he could. So far they have not had a call.



Sometimes it seems as though there is all the support in the world and sometimes if feels like a lottery. For Owen, things seemed more hopeful. He was delivered to a probation hostel; we had given him some information about local churches. He has a home to go to once his probation stay is finished. *"I need to find out who I am"* he said. *"I've got a relationship with Jesus now and I've never had that before. I need to find my new identity."* So he went, hopeful but unsure, wanting to stay rooted in his faith and wary of being pulled away by old associates. Moving on from the past is never straightforward.




What is Church?

Rhapsody in August was considered a disappointment when it premiered at Cannes in May 1991. It is not one of the writer and director's, Akira Kurosawa, great films, but shows him thoughtfully trying to come to peace with the central event of his times.

3rd May - Saving Grace (1986)

A young pope who feels he has lost touch with the people accidentally locks himself out of the Vatican and believes it is part of God's plan for him.

14th June - First Reformed (2017)

Paul Schrader's powerful new drama, First Reformed, is Shaker furniture in movie form: stark, plain, conceived in austere and intelligent good taste; beautifully made, in fact.

5th July - Still Alice (2015)

Still Alice is a must for all Dementia Champions. This film has been adapted from the novel by neuroscientist Lisa Genova. It casts Julianne Moore as a 50-year-old linguistics professor whose bouts of forgetfulness are devastatingly diagnosed as early onset Alzheimer's.

Our churchwarden, Ros Martin (née Henry), remembers planting some of the bulbs brought back from Lincoln. She says

"It was Sydney's initiative to plant out the yard, and his love of spring flowers, which has helped to create a beautiful display in spring.

"I remember planting them, when I was at school, so I know he had plenty of help."

The competition is run by Ecclesiastical Insurance and in addition to submitting a photograph with a meaning that typified your parish, you were asked to submit a sentence describing what makes your parish special.

We all considered that both entries from Saddleworth were quite outstanding. There were some amazing ideas and some beautiful churches.

The area winners were recently announced and it was really no surprise that neither church had been selected to represent the Northwest in the final judging. When we saw our area winner, there was no doubt that it was the sentiment and action of the parish and the fact that the photograph told a genuine story that proved a winner. Judge for yourself! However, we are still quite proud of our own entry and feel it echoes the sentiment of an Eco Church. We now know what to aim for if and when the competition takes place again and certainly gives us something to aim for.

The next big fundraiser is the Summer Fete on Saturday, 20th June.



In Memory of Christine Barlow

There will still be many people in Dobcross and Scouthead who remember Christine, the dearly loved wife of Canon Bill Barlow and also part-time teacher at the old Holy Trinity Primary School on Platt Lane.

On Monday, 24th February at her funeral service in Church, Revd Godfrey Adams recalled that way back in 1964, Bill, Christine and their young family, Clare and Nicholas, arrived in Dobcross and lived in the vicarage in Streethouse Lane.

It was not until the early 1980s that they moved into the newly-built vicarage on Woods Lane and so were 'next door to the shop'. Christine, a keen gardener, quickly set to work with spade and fork to create a new garden of lawns, flower beds and a vegetable plot. For many years Christine with a rota of helpers kept the church brasses in pristine condition.



When Canon Bill retired through ill health in 1998, they moved with their faithful dogs over Standedge to live in Marsden. Christine died, aged 85 years, in a care home in Stalybridge.

He was knit together in his mother's womb fearfully and wonderfully made. The silence of the silent night was broken by cries of a new-born, bloody, babe.

"Clearly there is no single technology, policy or action to solve Climate Change. It will require people from all walks of life locally, nationally and internationally."

It needs to be governments, companies <u>and</u> individuals taking actions.

While governments and industry have to make changes we individuals can make a difference too. Fill your kettle with only the water you need for your cuppa. Any surplus can go into a Thermos. The Energy Saving Trust estimates that if everyone in the UK did this, the UK could run half the country's street lights on the saved electricity.

This is the first item in Saddleworth Parish Council's information on how to reduce one's carbon footprint which is due to be published imminently.

We have always held a stall and come what may, we will be there on 9th April from 9:00am to 12 noon selling goods on behalf of our church.



My brother's hill top funeral

As I mentioned last time, work on historic buildings is never straightforward - and so it has proven. Nonetheless, we hope this element of the works to Save Saddleworth Church will be completed by early May.



Our contractor, Mather & Ellis Ltd, is making steady progress despite the recent horrendous weather.

Completion of this element will successfully conclude the SiB campaign and I offer my gratitude (and congratulations) to all who have given time and / or money to make this happen. Completion of this work though, should in no way detract from the level of effort required still to 'Save Saddleworth Church' and this of course will be the campaign name from here on in. The building still requires somewhere in the region of £1million to save it!

Ideas for further community fundraising are in development and we continue to build upon plans to apply for the major funding required – likely to be the Heritage Lottery Fund. We hope that successful completion of this 100% community-funded project (SiB) will demonstrate to funders that we are able to deliver capital projects on this iconic building. This can only add weight to any future bids.

I must again thank Fiona Ward for developing the necessary plans and documents to get us into the right place to apply for funds. However, we still acknowledge the need for fresh ideas, approaches and funding and ask everyone to attend the forthcoming events and consultations.

The scaffolding has gone up at the East end of the Parish Church. Black plastic is draped over the inside and the organ is now wrapped up to protect it from dust and cold. Outside the scaffolding is also wrapped and looks a little incongruous glistening in the green hill setting. It all adds its own wailing music throughout the services during these strong winds.

During a packed St Chad's Day celebratory service, where the three parish congregations had gathered to worship, red fabric was used so that the magnificent depiction of St Chad was shown in its full beauty. This had been created by Janet Iles and used at the afternoon tea (the day before) surrounded by our red CTiS banners.



Next, a part of the large old cast iron central heating pipes rusted and had to be urgently replaced. Of course, nothing like it is used today and it had to be specially made. This week work will start on the inside of the tower to put up mesh to keep the weather and rooks out. The rooks have previously nested inside and left much debris. The hatch at the top of the tower also needs securing as the high winds have broken it. Inspecting the roof and clearing the gutters has also been completed in January. All necessary and costly work that is almost unseen except when not done and the rain gets in.

How do we help sustain God's creation?

- † Eat less meat;
- † Eat more vegetables;
- † Create compost heaps;
- † Eat locally-sourced, organic, seasonal food;
- † Invest in sustainable clothing;
- † Walk, cycle or use public transport;
- † Consider an electric car;
- † Use renewable energy.



Traidcraft also points out that organic food growing methods are not only better for the soil but they are better for the workers in the fields where chemical fertilisers and pesticides can be harmful to their health.

The Ecology of the soil depends upon microbes which get destroyed by the use of chemicals. Organic methods may produce less in the short term but are essential for the health of living organisms including ourselves.

Praying through Art

When I became an ALM in Worship just over three years ago, I had no idea that my art was going to become a big part of my ministry.

It all began when Jackie Calow was a Minister here. She asked me if I would decorate the Parish Centre on the theme of Easter for the newly-formed Café Church. I have always loved material and colour and I created an Easter banner.

My banner-making has now become a really important part of my worship and prayer and I find I can share this with others through the medium of art. I have led two workshops in the last year with the Foundation for Ministry Course, helping the course members to create their own banners.

Creating Art as an Expression of Prayer

We often think of prayer as something we read, say, or listen to. But prayer can also be a visual experience; it is oft said that *"a picture is worth a thousand words"*. Images and all forms of visual arts can often bring meaning that cannot be put into words. This is what I feel I have been doing with my banners. I pray on a particular theme, find an image that reflects what I want to say, alongside a line or two from scripture, or the whole image and idea forms in my head. Creating the banners brings this "prayer" to others and hopefully inspires and helps them to come closer to God.

Last summer, whilst I was doing some painting at Dobcross School for the School Leavers end of term production, I was asked if I would be interested in coming into school and doing some artwork with the children around themes in the Bible. As a result of this request I have been working with both KS1 and KS2 children in the last few months on two Bible themes: 'Women in the Bible' and 'The Last Supper'.

KS1 children have found out about Mary and for the visual part of this work I drew a large stained glass window, which the children created in tissue stuck to tracing paper squares attached to clear plastic sheeting. This has been mounted in the Library with battery lights behind. I am now working with KS2 children on "The Last Supper" by Leonardo Da Vinci and hope to share the finished work in the next issue of The Grapevine.

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

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Who are the Samaritans and what exactly do they do?

Most people have heard of the Samaritans but there may be some who are not too sure what we do. So...

For those in distress, despair, those who feel isolated or have suicidal thoughts, we will listen without judgment, giving callers a safe space to explore their feelings. We are available 24 hours a day 365 days a year to offer confidential support by phone or email.

Our vision is that fewer people die by suicide. There were 6,859 suicides in the UK and Republic of Ireland in 2018 – that's 18 per day! Of these, 759 (aged 15 to 24) were young people.

Suicide is not inevitable; it is preventable.

We know that the sooner you talk to someone about your suicidal thoughts and feelings, the sooner these feelings are alleviated and thoughts can be explored.

Not all callers, however, have suicidal thoughts. Our callers tell us about all kinds of issues: relationships, family, abuse, mental health, bereavement, work, study, bullying, isolation, etc; the list is endless. We give people the time and space to talk and, most importantly, we listen for however long it takes, no advice given.
